The Bracebridge Herald says: It begins to look as if the iron ore of Draper, Oakley and Longford would be mined and that right soon. The abovementioned townships contain ore, and in parts the mineral (which is of swamp variety) is at least eight feet thick. Experts from New York have been over the ground during the past two weeks, and stated that they thought all the low lying land in that section contained iron. Options obtained are for three and six months for mining rights on the land, and options have also been obtained on several water-falls, with the idea of using electricity in the work of development and for a railway to tap the G. T. R. at the switch a short distance south of this town. It is understood that the company has good financial backing and really means business. It will be a good thing for Bracebridge to have a large iron mine on her outskirts.
