District Notes.

The stones supposed to be diamonds found in Ops township have turned out to be of no value, and search has been discontinued.

Lindsay temperance workers met a few days ago to discuss the subject of local option. A public meeting will be held at an early date, at which outside speakers will be present.

Havelock Freemasons are contemplating running an excursion to Fenelon Falls.

Beaverton will hold a big athletic meet on June 9th. One of the attractions will be a marathon race of 11 1/2 miles for a gold cup valued at \$100. A. C. Kay, Beaverton, is secretary.

Three men, William Hancock, George Hancock and Geo. West, while experimenting with a blasting compound near Haliburton on Saturday, were very seriously injured by the unexpected explosion of the compound. George West had his right arm shattered, and his throat badly lacerated. William Hancock's face was torn open and his eyes burned. Geo. Hancock's injuries were less severe.

Lindsay is considering a proposition to establish a graphite refining industry. Two Toronto gentlemen are behind the scheme, which is endorsed by leading citizens. The promoters are asking a free site of two acres, and ten years' exemption from taxation, and require to sell stock to the amount of \$15,000. Forty or fifty men would be employed. There is said to be plenty of material in Haliburton, Parry Sound and Peterboro districts.

An inter-denominational meeting was held on Monday night at the home of Rev. W. J. Crighton at Lakefield for the purpose of considering the formation of a local branch of the Laymen's Missionary Movement. It was decided to hold a banquet in June, at which several prominent men in the Laymen's movement will give addresses.

Cobourg Sentinel Star.—According to Port Hope GAZETTE the town of Port Hope has a bill amounting to \$2,337.17 for the recent smallpox epidemic there. \$195.80 is for vaccine used by the doctors. Rawdon has a doctor's bill for smallpox for 1918, amounting to \$1,350, just about \$1000 in excess of what it should be. Is it not high time that municipalities rebelled against the doctors who attend smallpox cases? It is simply outrageous savoring almost of robbery. And yet, people bear up under the burden and never fight it. Is it not to be wondered at? Legislation should be had also on the charges of doctor's private practice which to say the least, in many cases are extortionate. Truly the public suffer long without a remedy.

New Liskeard Herald: The price of lumber is maintained at an extravagant figure in Elk Lake and Gowganda. Mr. Louis Joy, of New Liskeard, a carpenter and builder, returned from that county on Friday last, and reports that in Elk Lake green spruce is selling for \$30 per thousand feet, dry spruce for \$40 per thousand, and dry pine for \$60 per thousand. In Gowganda, where the rate of \$20 per thousand is charged on stumpage by the Provincial Government, green pine is selling at \$50 per thousand, and slabs are sold for \$20 per thousand.

The new provincial license for temperance hotels provided for under the legislation of the recent session, will be known as the "inspected hotel permit." The form of the permit has, it is understood, been drafted, and will probably be approved under Order in Council this week. Unlike liquor licenses, these hotel permits can be secured at any time during the year on application to the commissioners, approval of the hotel and payment of the \$5.00 license fee. The standard of equipment and sanitation required from the temperance hotels will be the equal of that called for on licensed premises. The applying hotel will be inspected and required to come up to the standard. This being done, it will be entitled to be advertised as a provincial inspected hotel. A list will be made public of these places, in order that the travelling public may be assured as to comfort, cleanliness and equipment.
