Dr. Mason the Choice of Convention.

Over two hundred Conservative delegates from all parts of the riding gathered at the Falls on Tuesday for the purpose of selecting a candidate to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Carnegie. The delegates, with the many other members of the party who took an interest in the event, made up quite a good sized crowd. Nearly the whole afternoon was taken up with the business for which the delegates had assembled. Eleven names were placed before the convention, as follows:

A. Y. Hopkins, Kinnmount; Jas. Lithgow, Bobcaygeon; Geo. A. Jordan and I. E. Weldon, Lindsay; Thos. Stephenson and Geo. Balfour, Omemece; Dr. Mason and John Aldous, Fenelon Falls; J. H. Delamere, Minden; J. Lockhart Gordon, Toronto; D. Tolmie, Glenarm.

Messrs. Aldous and Tolmie withdrew, leaving nine to be voted on. Four ballots were taken, Dr. Mason and Messrs. Balfour, Jordan and Weldon remaining on the final ballot, the others having dropped out as the voting proceeded. Dr. Mason had a good lead at all stages, and eventually received the necessary majority, Mr. Balfour of Omemece being next on the list.

Dr. Mason has been a resident of the Falls for many years, and as Secretary of the Association is pretty well known throughout the constituency. He has been a member of the council and school board, reeve of the village for 1907 and 1908 and warden of the county during the last year. The next session of the House will not commence until January or February, which will leave Dr. Mason plenty of time to get his bearings and make arrangements for the satisfactory continuance of his business during his absence at Toronto—that is, if he gets that far, which looks extremely probable at present, as there is no Reform opposition in sight. Dr. Mason will without doubt make a very capable representative.

Nomination day is on Tuesday next, the 18th, and election day one week later.

Valuable Property Changes Hands.

The property advertised by the Fitzgerald estate some time ago, on the south-west corner of Colborne and Francis streets, directly opposite the Mansion House, has been sold to Mr. J. H. Brandon. Everyone who knows Mr. Brandon, who has been in business at the Falls for thirty years, knows that there will be something doing in the way of building operations before a great while, and that any structure that may be erected will be a credit to the town. The lot has 66 feet frontage on Colborne street and is a first class business stand. It is at present occupied by Messrs. W. T. Robson and John Northey, implement agents, and Thos. Graham, insurance.

Lindsay Citizens Favor Local Option.

At a mass meeting of Lindsay citizens, on Friday evening of last week, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved,—That this meeting of citizens of the town of Lindsay, after mature consideration of the matter, are of the opinion that the time is ripe for local option, and that a committee be appointed to prepare and circulate a petition requesting the town council to submit a local option by-law at the next municipal election, and to take such other action in the matter as they consider advisable.—Carried.

Mr. F. S. Spence, of Toronto, and Messrs. J. P. Donald and J. D. Flavelle, of Lindsay, were the principal speakers. A strong committee was appointed to prepare and circulate a petition, and those in favor of local option are very hopeful that the by-law, if submitted, will be carried.

"Scenes in a Union Depot."

Miss Luella Z. Drake, with the assistance of local talent, presented the entertainment bearing the above title last Friday evening to a well-filled house. The various occurrences in the depot were very amusing, and pleased the large audience immensely. The acting by the local participants was particularly good, even the children carrying out their parts to perfection. The automobile song and drill, the "Manhattan Isle" song and accompanying chorus and suit case drill were much enjoyed. "So long, Mary," song and chorus, also took the fancy of the audience. Miss Drake's singing in two voices, baritone and soprano, was something out of the common. Her baritone voice could not be distinguished from a man's voice, and a good one at that. Her character sketches were also cleverly executed. The entertainment was under the auspices of the public library, which cleared about \$38 over all expenses.

A Dairy Farm's Competition.

A committee composed of leading farmers and dairymen representing the dairy cattle breeders' association and dairymen's associations of Ontario, have completed arrangements for the holding, this year, of a dairy farms competition through Ontario. The prizes will consist of sixty gold and silver medals and diplomas, as well as a large number of special prizes, the details of which have not yet been arranged.

The Province will be divided into four districts as follows:—From Kingston east; from Kingston to Yonge St., Toronto; western Ontario, north and south of a line running from Hamilton to Goderich. There will be a competition this year for the best farms in each district, and five gold and ten silver medals will be offered this year in each district. The farms will be judged twice; once about July 1st, and again some time during December, thus giving the judges an opportunity to see the farms under winter and summer conditions.

Next year the farms in eastern Ontario and all farms in western Ontario which win prizes in the competition this year, will be allowed to compete in special competitions to decide the best farm in eastern Ontario and the best farm in western Ontario. Two years from now, it is proposed to hold a final competition, in which the leading farms for both eastern and western Ontario will compete to decide which is the best farm in the Province. Exceptionally fine prizes will be offered in this final competition.

All branches of farm work will be included in the competition. In all 1,000 points will be offered. These points will be subdivided as follows:—House and surroundings 150; farm buildings 150; live stock 200; crops 200; farm management 150; farm machinery 75; permanent improvements 75. Several prizes will be offered to the farms that score the highest points on the house and surroundings; on poultry; on orchards and other similar departments.

Competitions of this kind were held in Ontario some 25 years ago, and created great interest. The gold medal farmer in the Province at that time was Mr. Simpson Rennie, the well known Farmers' Institute speaker, who now lives in Toronto.

The committee which has charge of the competition is composed of Messrs. H. Glendinning, of Manilla; G. A. Gillespie, of Peterborough, representing the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association; Mr. D. A. Dempsey, of Stratford, and S. R. Wallace, of Burgessville, representing the Western Ontario Dairymen's Association; Mr. W. W. Ballantyne, of Stratford; D. Duncan, of Don; Geo. McKenzie, of Thornhill; R. F. Hicks, of Newtonbrook; Gordon Gooderham of York Mills, Simpson Rennie and W. G. Ellis, of Toronto; and H. B. Cowan, of Peterborough, the Secretary.

Full particulars about the competition may be obtained from the Secretary. Already a number of leading farmers in Ontario have indicated their intention to take part in the competition, which promises to create a great interest and be productive of much good.
