
As indicated, the day on which they annually demonstrate their peculiar political beliefs is January 30th, and their favorite method of expressing their loyalty to the "Sovereign over the Water" consists in placing beautiful floral wreaths on the equestrian statute of Charles I. which stands at the south side of Trafalgar Square, looking towards Whitehall.

Up till recently little attention was paid by the authorities to the sentiments expressed on these wreaths. Latterly some became so seditious in tone that the Government very properly intervened, and now no memorial can be laid on King Charles' statue unless it has first been approved by an official

censor. The various wreaths usually contain the word "Remember." As students of history know, this was the last word uttered by King Charles, and was addressed to Bishop Juxon, who accompanies. him to the scaffold.

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
