#### The Milk Question.

The Gazette is indebted to W. K. McNaught, M.P.P. for North Toronto, for a copy of a pamphlet bearing the above title and containing the report of the discussion in the Legislature on the resolution introduced at the last session by Mr. McNaught for the appointment of a Royal Commission to examine into and report upon the milk supply of the Province. In Mr. McNaught's address in support of the resolution he quotes Dr. Black of Hants, N.S., as stating that "Canada was losing \$1,201 persons by death every year, of whom one-third, or 27,070, die from preventable diseases," and that "out of these \$1,201 deaths \$1,347 were children under five years of age, and that one-half of them were slaughtered by poisonous milk." Prof. Von Behring says that in Germany, of every 1,000 children born alive, 237 die during the first year of life, 490 never attain maturity, and that these facts are attributable to infection in infancy from diseased milk. In the United States, according to John Spargo, one-third of all the babies born die before reaching the age of five years. Dr. J. C. O. Hastings, of Toronto, addressing the Dominion Medical Association recently, said: "In the Province of Ontario in 1906 there were 10,085 deaths of children under five years of age, or nearly one-half of the entire number of deaths from all causes in the whole province. How many in the province have been poisoned by milk we unfortunately have no records to show. We can only say that where the samples of milk have been examined the conditions found in Ontario have been practically the same as those in other countries." In the city of Rochester, in the two months of July and August, during a period of ten years, the mortality of children under five years of age was 2,297. Municipal milk stations were then established and healthy, "certified" milk dispensed, and the mortality for the same two months during the ensuing ten years was 1,143, or less than half the number it had been.

The above cited facts show conclusively that impure milk is chiefly responsible for the high death rate amongst children of tender years. The experience of the city of Rochester, which established municipal milk stations, and the experience of the Toronto Hospital authorities, who succeeded, simply by personal persuasion, in inducing the farmers from whom they bought their milk to supply a practically pure article in place of a very undesirable article, point the way to methods that may be taken to secure a pure milk supply. The success of Rochester and of the General Hospital authorities also makes doubtful the necessity of appointing a Royal Commission to enquire into the matter; but as the Commission will probably be appointed, it is to be hoped that no time will be lost in selecting the men who will serve on it, and that the Commission will conduct its investigations and decisive action be taken without needless delay. In the opinion of the best authorities, ninety per cent. of the injurious effects of milk are due to the germs contained in "plain, common, every-day dirt," and the duty of the most scrupulous cleanliness on the part of all persons who have the care of milch cows cannot be too strongly urged.

#### The Stevens Estate.

"The Master in Chambers reserved judgment on a motion by Mr. J. Creighton for an order directing the former solicitor of Mrs. Jennie Noland to return papers relating to her estate in Cuba, which is valued at \$4,000,000. The property in question consists of 10,000 acres of sugar plantations with the mills situated near Cardenas, Matanzas County, Cuba, formerly owned by the late James Stevens and left by him to his nephew, Jeremiah Stevens, carpenter, Wanbaushene. The latter inherited in 1903 and was on the point of leaving for Cuba, when he was taken ill and died of cancer on Oct. 6th, 1903. He willed the property to his wife and from her it passed to her daughter, Mrs. Noland, formerly of 58 Mackenzie Crescent, Toronto, but now living with her husband, a lumberman, at French River. It is stated that \$2,000,000 was offered by New York capitalists and refused, as information to hand indicated that the value was about double that amount. Mr. Creighton has been instructed to proceed to Cuba as soon as he obtains the desired papers and to sell the property for \$4,000,000 or over, receiving a minimum commission of \$100,000 and expenses."

The above item of news, which appeared in the law court proceedings of the Mail and Empire of June 3rd, soon became a topic of conversation in the Falls, where Mr. Jeremiah Stevens resided for the greater part of his life. The Mrs. Noland mentioned is a daughter of the second wife of Mr. Stevens. The sons of the first wife of Mr. Stevens at the Falls, James, William and Thomas, have

employed Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, of Lindsay, to look after their interests.

Mr. McLaughlin has made enquiries concerning the will said to have been made, leaving the property to Mrs. Stevens, but so far has not been able to find any record of it, and it seems probable that no such will was made. In this event the greater part of the proceeds of the estate in question, which includes property in New York City, will come to the sons here, who, with their friends are awaiting with much interest further developments in the matter.
