same day. Tickets are good for three

over night.

Dominion Day at Burnt River

Burnt River residents will celebrate
the first of July in good style this year.
In the morning at ten o'clock there will
be a calithumpian procession, after
which the following list of sports will
be run off: Football Match, Horse
Races, for the fastest and slowest horse,
Baby Show, Tug of War, Men's Race,
200 and 100 yards, Boys' Boot and shoe
Race, Boys' Race over 15 and under 15,
Fat Man's Race, Fat Woman's Race,
Three-legged Race, Sack Race, Wheel-
barrow Race, Ladies' Race, Girls' Race,
Shoulder Stone, Running Jump, Hop
Step and Jump, Standing Jump, Long
Jump. Dinner and Tea will be served,
and there will be a Concert in the evening.
Dinner 25 cts, tea and concert 25c.
The committee in charge have also ar-
ranged for dancing.

TOOK ORIENTAL DEGREE.—About seven-
teen members of Corona Lodge No.
398 I. O. F. went on Monday evening per
steamer Kawartha to Lindsay, where the
Oriental Degree was conferred by the
Lindsay brethren on Bros. C. W. Bur-
goyne, H. Copp, Dr. Sims and A. Hawkins.
The visitors were afterwards entertain-
ed at a moonfeast, and report having
had a pleasant outing and a fine time
generally.

THE NAID.—The Government steam
patrol yacht, the Naid, passed through
the locks on Tuesday on her way to the
upper lakes. The yacht is in charge of
a Game and Fishery Warden, part of
whose duties is to see that local
wardens are not neglecting their work.
The course of the Naid, which will be
in the control of Capt. R. W. Carson,
will extend through seven counties.
Lake Seugog will be visited during the
duck season. The counties through
which the Naid will pass in her long
winding course are Simcoe, Ontario,
York, Peterborough, Victoria, Durham
and Northumberland.

IMPROVING THE CANAL BANKS.—A few
years ago Lockmaster Junkin planted a
number of young maples and a few other
trees along the edge of the locks, and
has otherwise improved the landscape
in the vicinity by setting out plants and
sowing flower seeds each spring and
keeping everything neat and tidy, very
much to his credit. The trees are nearly
all alive and thrifty. They are now
quite a noticeable size, and cast a shade
that is very agreeable on hot days. This
week the bank near the McArthur House
is being sodded, having been previously
prepared. The work of improvement is
going steadily along, something being
done each season toward beautifying
the lock premises.

FISHING AGAIN.—The open season for
bass and lunge commenced on Wednes-
day, and quite a number of residents
were out on the water early in the
morning and met with varying degrees
of success.

KILLED BY LIGHTING.—During the
thunder storm on Sunday evening a
well known old white horse belonging

imal was tethered outside at the time.

GYPSIES.—A gang of picturesquely
attired gypsy women invaded the town
on Monday and Tuesday, and carried on
a vigorous but not extremely successful
fortune telling campaign. They are said
to be Mexicans, but speak French fairly
well. The sock crop must have been a
failure in whatever country they came
from, or else the members of the tribe
are boycotting the industry, for none of
them appeared to have anything inside
their boots except feet. After they left,
Constable Jones was sent for to investi-
gate alleged depredations in the country,
but found no stolen goods in the pos-
session of the gypsies. All he found was
a sick gosling and a varied assortment
of bad smells. The fortune tellers were
consequently not molested or arrested.

that one of the horses was in the creek.
He instantly jumped on the other horse
