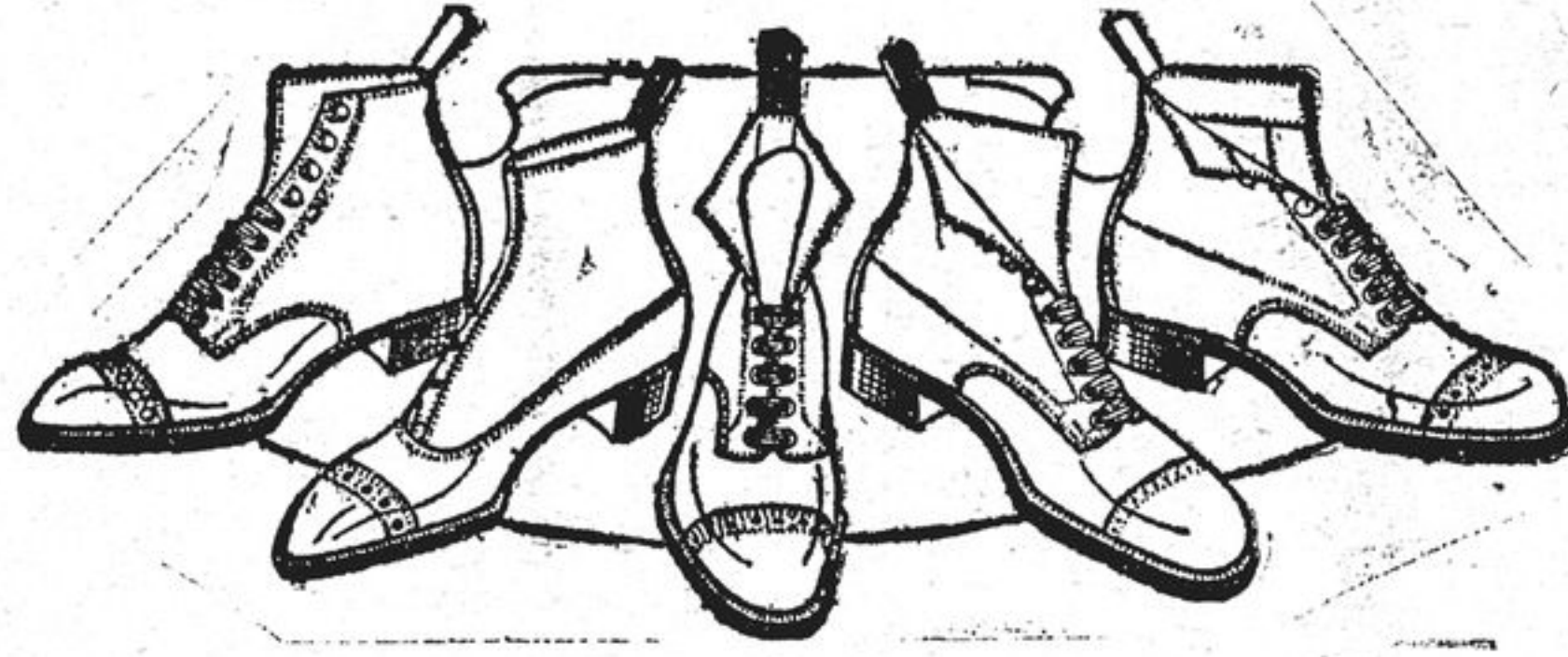

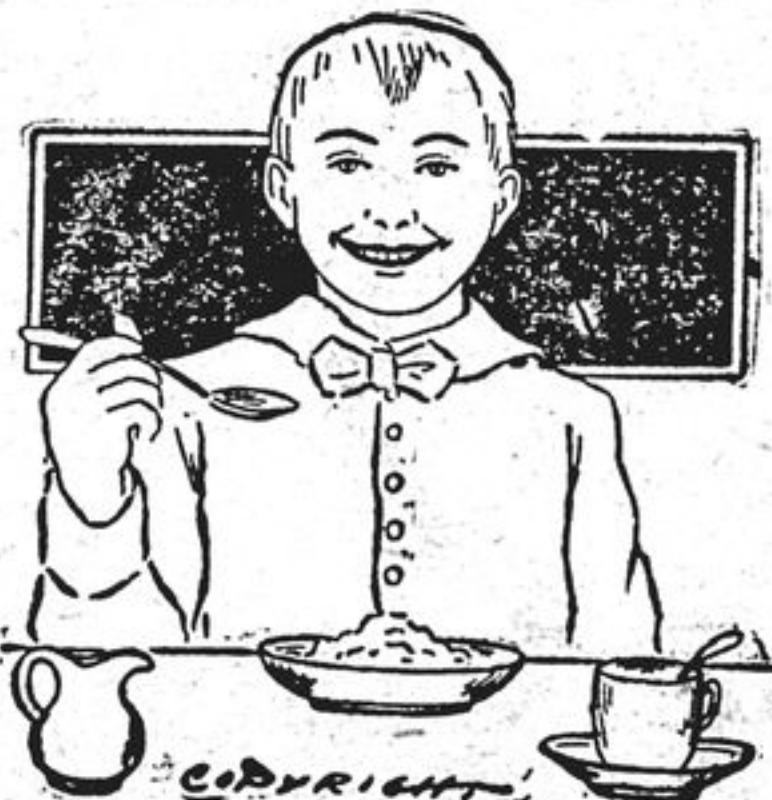

And pillared the blue firmament with light?  
Down all the stretch of Hell to its last gulf

More fraught with menace to the Universe.

What gulfs between him and the Seraphim!  
Slave to the wheel of labor, what to him
