Eleven hundred excursionists were fog-bound all night on the journey from London to Yarmouth. Mrs. S. H. Cohen of Broadway, Westminster, received a telegram from the King congratulating her on having reached her 100th birthday.

At a sale of hackneys and harness horses at Wrexham recently 500 guineas was paid for a fifteen hands harness horse. The buyer was an American show exhibitor.

A man formerly in the employ of the Salvation Army has been arrested in connection with an outbreak of fire at the Salvation Army shed in Lorenzo street, King's Cross.

Although about 500 bathers were in Queensmere Pond, Wimbledon Common, when Walter Roffey, aged 26, of Haldon road, Wandsworth, was drowned, not one of them witnessed the fatality.

Miss Catharine Evangeline Booth-Clibborn, granddaughter of General Booth, will be married to the Rev. James Strachan, M.A., minister of the Presbyterian Church, Belgrave square, on September 22.

While Messrs. Pezzach and Walter were bream and pollack angling from a boat off Penzance a shark took one of their baits and was captured after an exciting struggle. It measured 4 feet in length.

The Japanese Government has purchased a number of pure bred Minorca and Andalusian fowls from Captain Allen of Sawbridgeworth, and they have been despatched by the steamship Iyo Maru.

A Gorleston youth named Cullen, who a few days ago rescued a little girl from drowning in the river, has been presented with a silver watch by the band boys of the Port of Hull Sailors' Orphan Home.

The Willesden police have issued a warning against counterfeit half-crowns and florins which are being largely circulated in the district. The spurious coins are excellent imitations of the genuine ones.

A ball played by Mr. C. E. Sheffield, on the Romford golf links, struck and dislodged a rook perched on an elm tree a hundred yards away. The bird died from its injuries.

Ptomaine poisoning caused by eating ice cream was the cause of death of George Ball, a Nottingham school-boy.

No fewer than 109 different specimens of wild flowers were shown by a Halberton child at the local flower show. Another child had 107 kinds.

Kneeling on the floor a married woman named Mileham was found dead at Yarmouth, with her head in a zinc washing bath containing two or three gallons of water.

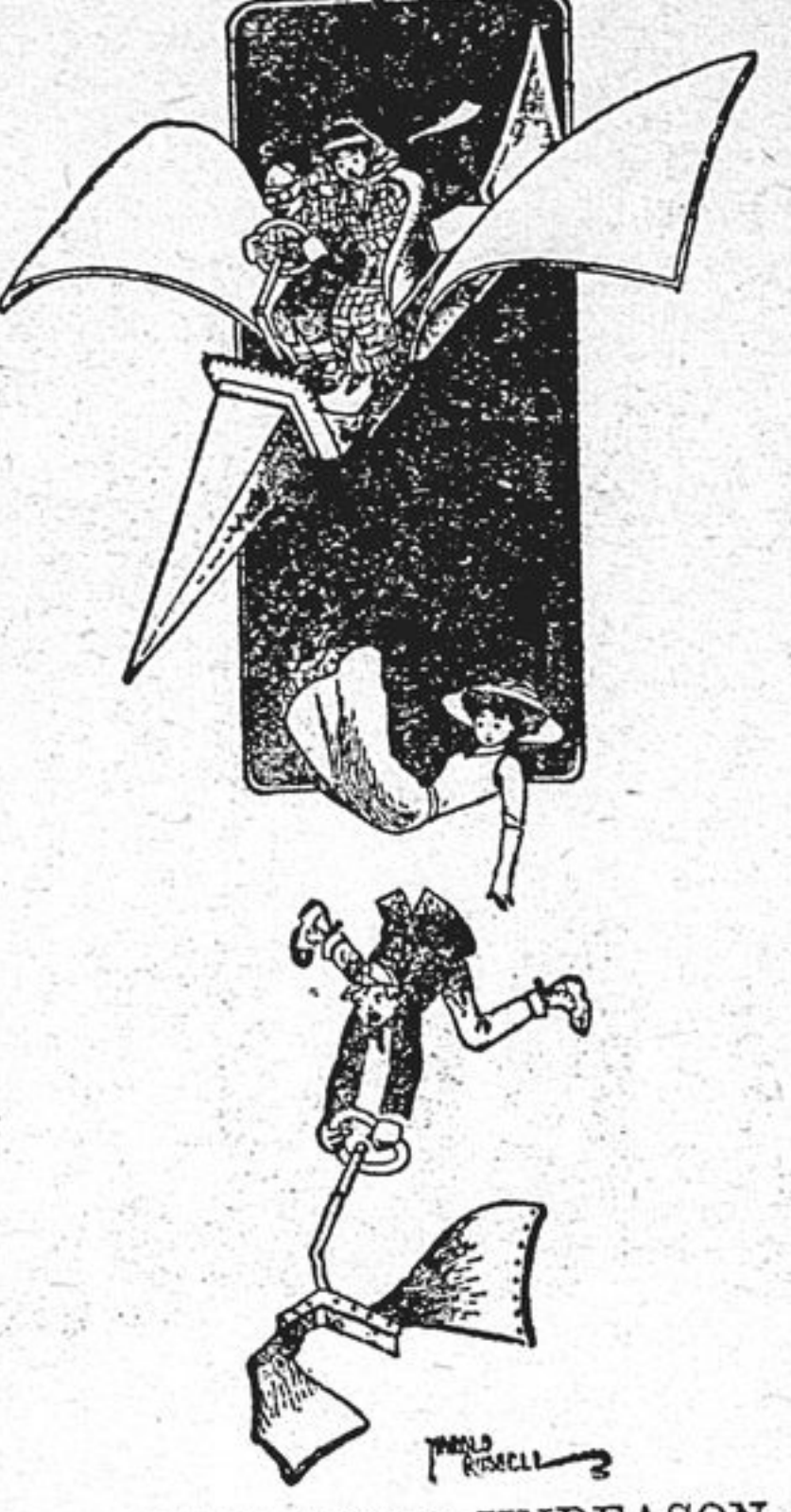

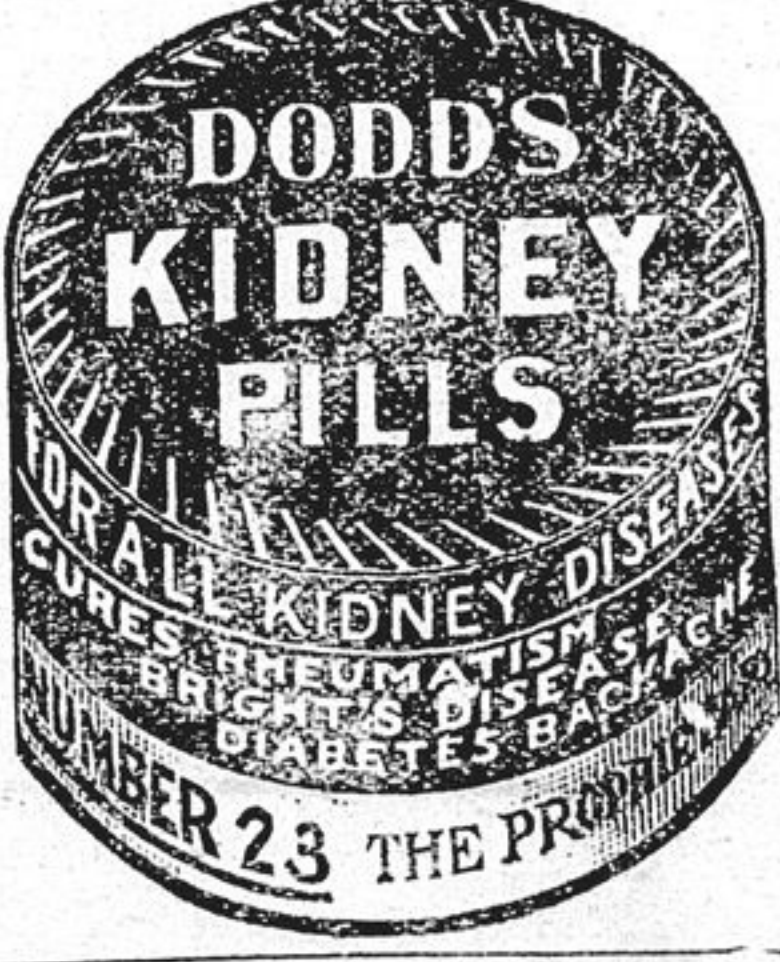
