17. Good tree . . . good fruit; . . . corrupt tree . . . evil fruit-This is an unchangeable law of nature. Fruit is the outward manifestation of the inward life. If the tree is good, its nature cannot (18) be made corrupt by expressing itself in fruit. The reverse is equally inevitable. If you want different fruit, there is but one way to get it-change the heart of the tree. Of course it is possible for a clever person to arrange clusters of grapes in an artificial fashion upon thorns, and give the appearance of a grapevine. But then they cease to be fruit and become figments.






