The Wisdom of Winnipeg.

The vote on the power franchise in Lindsay, asked for by The Electric Power Co., has been postponed for three months, pending investigations of the proposals of the Ontario Hydro Electric Commission. In connection with this matter the following from an exchange regarding the recent action of Winnipeg is of interest:

"The city of Winnipeg, Man., has just completed a 60,000 h. p. water power plant to produce electricity for heat, light and power. Instead of permitting some capitalists to do this, and use it to build up fortunes for themselves and their heirs at the common expense, the people there did this for themselves, and all future generations there will have these essentials to modern life at their actual cost. When the city desires to induce industries, she is in a position to offer them heat, light and power for almost no cost to herself; or, if she prefers to develop and sell the products at a profit, she can have her total public expenses of government paid by the profits; she can build all kinds of public improvements and schools, and not have a cent of tax on her property. This principle is so very simple that it would seem that any child would see through it; but here, where the people have been educated by those who monopolize these natural advantages for the purpose of building up families of wealth, the common people are as ignorant of the things they are giving away as if they were illiterate savages. There are in this country more of what are termed "public utilities" owned by the few and used to exploit the many, than would run the whole national, county, city, school and good roads expenses of the nation and have no form of taxation whatever."

Dr. Gould Resigns—Dr. Sims is Reeve.

FIVE IN FIELD FOR COUNCIL.

Dr. Gould, who has occupied the position of reeve of Fenelon Falls for two years, has resigned in favor of Dr. Sims, who was also nominated on Monday last. Dr. Sims is, therefore, reeve for 1911 by acclamation.

The nominations for council were Messrs. J. H. Stanton, Alfred Teirs, Thomas Cashore, Sam. Corbett, John Shane, M. W. Brandon, Foster Kelly, Lewis Deyman, John S. Northey and Robert Martin. Of these, Messrs. Cashore, Corbett, Shane, Stanton and Teirs have qualified, and the electors will choose between them on Monday.

The school board remains as it was last year, Messrs. John H. Brandon, T. Poulson and A. McFarland, new men who were nominated, having resigned.

Messrs. George Martin and William McArthur were nominated for the office of Light, Heat & Power Commissioner. Mr. Martin resigned, and the commissioners will be the same as last year, with the exception of the reeve.

At the nomination meeting last Monday, Dr. Gould briefly outlined the work of the council for the year, and also touched upon county matters. He said he had acted to the best of his ability and judgment, and tried to deal fairly in all matters that came up for consideration while he was in office.

Dr. Sims asked for information regarding various matters, and criticised last year's council for lowering the rate of assessment instead of raising it, as he claims should have been done.

Mr. Wm. McArthur spoke briefly regarding L. H. & P. affairs, and mentioned the accident to the mill, which had been repaired in a first-class manner by Mr. F. Northey, the total cost being about \$375. Notwithstanding this unexpected expenditure, L. H. & P. matters are in a satisfactory condition.

Dr. Mason, who has been up and out for some time since his accident on the 21st of October last, made a few remarks concerning the schools, stating that the last year had been the best yet. Teachers are hard to secure. The board had advertised for a teacher at \$400 a year, and did not get one answer. An offer of \$450 brought three or four replies. In the past year five teachers had been engaged who did not come.

Mr. W. T. Junkin pointed out that, ten or twelve years ago, \$225 was paid to teachers of the class that now receive \$45; and \$500 to \$550 to teachers now

getting \$1,000. This explained the increase in expenditure.

Messrs. S. Corbett and A. Teirs also spoke briefly. The other nominees were absent.

Reeve Jordan of Lindsay, who was present at the meeting, was called on. He complimented Dr. Gould highly on his record in the county council. Dr. Mason had also done good work. Mr. Jordan gave a short sketch of some of the matters which came before the county council, and justified their action in a few instances where criticism had been heard. He also touched on the electric power question, now engaging the attention of Lindsay, as being of interest to the people of Fenelon Falls.

In Fenelon township, Duncan Tolmie is reeve, Mr. Palmer having resigned. Mr. John Lee takes Mr. Tolmie's place in the council.

Verulam Council.

Council met at Town Hall, Bobcaygeon, on the 15th, pursuant to Statute, the Reeve and Councillors all present. On motion of Messrs. Mitchell and Green, the special grant of \$50 for completion of Swamp road by Jas. Stewart was passed.

The Clerk was instructed to have 50 copies of the proposed Highway Improvement By-law printed.

On motion of Messrs. Lewis and Green the grant of \$20 to Mr. Robertson, for drain between 9 and 10, con. 7, was ordered paid.

Messrs. W. Ellis and Robt. Curtis addressed council re wire fencing on Brandon's Hill.

Mr. John Mulligan presented a claim for breaking his axle at a bridge near Mr. Tinneys, and it was agreed that Mr. Green would inquire of the Reeve of Bobcaygeon.

On motion of Messrs. Lewis and Mitchell, council agreed to pay half of Fenelon cost for wire fencing on Brandon's hill, provided Fenelon agreed to have further costs incurred on the hill by Verulam.

The Reeve explained the matter of dog assessment, and on motion A. and Wm. Thurston were ordered a refund of \$1 on assessment of two dogs, each party living separately, and the same was granted to Thos. and Jos. Thurston on the same grounds, and Thos. V. Thurston \$1 for assessment of Geo. Thurston's dog.

On motion of Messrs. Lewis and Green David Burley was granted \$2 for damage to buggy on boundary line, Fenelon to be filed with half the amount.

Mr. Brooks reported being unable to obtain the required tile for Knox's drain, and had notified Mr. Knox accordingly.

Mr. Green reported a complaint of damage being done to the road in Wray's division by the removal of gravel, and on motion of Messrs. Lewis and Green, the Clerk will instruct Mr. Wray to post notices forbidding any trespassing.

The Collector presented statement showing the Roll fully completed and the amount \$12,914.81, satisfied.

On motion of Messrs. Green and Lewis the roll was received from the Collector, Mr. J. B. Kennedy.
