The formation of a Holstein Breeders' Association by Verulam farmers who are interested in Holsteins is a commendable action, and their example might well be followed by others who are occupied in various branches of agriculture. If the owners of pure bred stock would not only endeavor to raise the standard of their own animals, but form associations and make an effort to extend the circle, the result would soon be noticeable. But the greatest good comes where the farmers of any section agree to keep some one particular breed of animals. Buyers can then can go into that district and secure what they want in sufficient numbers to make a carload of fairly uniform quality, size and conformation, with a minimum expenditure of time. This is true of grain and fruit as well as live stock. The district becomes noted for its product, and an outside trade can be done that is impossible where each man has something different from anybody else's and pays little or no attention to what his neighbors are doing.
