### More Practical Instruction

From the Orillia Packet.

Before introducing the kind into the Public Schools, the should give careful consideration to the whole educational situation. unquestionably a growing distinction with the whole system, a thing that there must be a change in the results obtained do not march growing expense. But the change seems to be rather at the beginning end of the school than at the end. Our system has had no object or ideal, unless it be to train as many doctors, lawyers and engineers as possible. We train our children in the belief that a professional career should be the aim of every child, and then we wonder that the child languishes and that our work is so difficult in getting competent men. Too often the boy who intends to enter a factory leaves school because he does not see that the training he is receiving is likely to be of use to him when he enters a store or an office. At a certain extent he is right. I believe Canada needs for her development a different kind of gentry, but men who are practical, and know how to labor with their hands. And we must look to our schools to produce them. To this end we need for a marked development in a few years in the direction of practical instruction in the rural schools. Such instruction can be utilized to develop the mental powers and nature as well as the subject matter now taught. It will cost more, but it will be worth while. What is not more "frills," but greater usefulness and more practical instruction.

### Holstein Association.

The formation of a Holstein Breeders' Association by Verulam farmers who are interested in Holsteins is a commendable action, and their example might well be followed by others who are occupied in various branches of agriculture. If the owners of pure bred stock would not only endeavor to raise the standard of their own animals, but form associations and make an effort to extend the circle, the result would soon be noticeable. But the greatest good comes where the farmers of any section agree to keep some one particular breed of animals. Buyers can then go into that district and secure what they want in sufficient numbers to make a carload of fairly uniform quality, size and conformation, with a minimum expenditure of time. This is true of grain and fruit as well as live stock. The district becomes noted for its product, and an outside trade can be done that is impossible where each man has something different from anybody else's and pays little or no attention to what his neighbors are doing.

### I. O. O. F. at Lindsay.

About a dozen members of Corona Lodge I. O. O.
