Are You a Coward?

Are you not afraid to leave your children in the fierce struggle for bread and butter that the growing trusts and monopolies have produced for those who work? Surely you are not so stupid that you believe there are just as many opportunities now as there were when you were young? If you are, then there is no use appealing to your reason—for you have n't any. Any man who thinks his children have the same chance to get on as when the lands of the middle continent were free to any who would enter them, as when, with a small kit of tools, he could engage in tanning, shoe making, wagon making, or a hundred other industries now monopolized by great capital—I say that any man who think there are as many opportunities now as when we were boys, is a simpleton. Men have often said to me that their children could rustle as they had done—the poor fools not knowing that it is altogether different to-day; and those who say this are so poor, so illiterate, so ignorant—well, they have never been inside a really furnished house, never travelled except on foot or a short distance in a smoking car, never had anything but sweat shop clothes, never ate at a really good hotel—and they say that their children can rustle as they have! The pity of it is, that these old party bigots are honest, really thinking they are fortunate and have as good brains as the so-called "great" of the land; but their brains are undeveloped, like the muscles of a boy who can be made into an athlete by proper training. But to the men who really think, the future of their children is a cause of much alarm. The boys and girls growing up—I mean the great millions of them—will have as little show in the struggle of life against the present combinations of private capital as do the lambs who send their money to Wall street for shearing. Socialists have made a study of these things—and that is why they are Socialists. They know the CAUSE of existing conditions and they know the REMEDY for them; but they are helpless until they can get enough of others whose interests are similar to see the problem, and with their votes change things so that every willing worker will have exactly the same chance to rise to peace, plenty and pleasure that any other may. All we ask of you is to INVESTIGATE. All your old party healer wants is to keep you from coming in contact with the Socialist argument. You are a soft snap for them now, and they do not want you to get away from them, like the rest of us have. Are you brave enough, are you free enough, to read a book on Socialism?—Appeal to Reason.

Waste of Competition.

Within four centuries one of the races of mankind, the red, has been run practically extinct. A continent four times the size of Europe has been filled with the people of Europe. Farm lands ten times as great as Europe's have been set to work to feed Europe and her descendants. New food and clothing products—maize and cotton, potatoes, tomatoes and tobacco,—and the finest forests in the world, splendid building stone, rich clays and minerals, coal and kerosene and a wealth of wild game and fish, have been added to the resources of Europe's people. And all this has not sufficed. The forests have been felled and the game is gone, the mines are rifled, farms have been exhausted and abandoned; and in spite of all these resources and this waste of wealth, the slum, the pauper and the tramp have come. Only one in five has a home of his own, and, when their estates are settled, nine out of ten leave nothing as a result of a life-long effort. The "submerged tenth" has become a by-word, and in competition by combination, which many erroneously consider a failure of competition, the masses can now see their finish. Nor is this all. Unable to sustain itself in its present way of living, even under these advantageous conditions, the world is mortgaging the future in order to exist. Up to a century ago debt was a rarity in America. Now, almost everyone is in debt. All are born with a heritage of debt hanging over them—if nothing else, a public debt. Every nation of Europe, and of the descendants of Europe's people has, within the last century, enslaved its subjects and their children with a debt that it can never pay. And why was it done? Chiefly to obtain means to hunt men and take their territory and exact tribute from them, in order that Europe and her children might be enabled to live. Africa has been taken by Europe, her people have been enslaved or butchered, her forests slaughtered and some of her animals hunted to extinction for profit. Russia has taken a third of Asia. England has India and extracts tribute, while millions of natives starve. Australia and the islands of the sea have been taken by Europe's peoples, and in many cases their original inhabitants have completely perished. Within fifty years Europe will have devoured the whole world; and still her peoples will be starving.—C. L. Phifer in The Coming Nation.
