#### Fenelon Fair Surpasses Previous Records.

The Fenelon Agricultural Society fair, held on Thursday last, was fortunate in weather conditions this fall, though it narrowly escaped a soaking similar to last year's, Friday being a very wet day. The show was distinctly in advance of previous exhibitions, and the attendance larger. The principal improvement was in the indoor display, which showed a decided increase in number of entries. The quality also was first class. Of the various live stock classes, the most noticeable increase was in cattle. Holsteins, Ayrshires and Shorthorns were most in evidence, several fine animals, fit for the largest exhibitions, being shown. In sheep and swine there was a slight improvement, The number of animals in these classes is usually not large, though the individuals exhibited are always worthy representatives of their respective breeds. The horses were a good lot, and over the average in numbers. Poultry made a good showing. Brown and White Leghorns and White Wyandottes were most numerous.

The named speeding event was won by Aldous's Jack, after a close contest. Jack took the second and fourth heats and Poulsom's Goldie the third, winning second money. At the start of the first heat Aldous's horse fell in trying to avoid a mad puddle, throwing the driver, Mr. John Aldous, out over his head. The cart of Goldie, who was just behind, went over the fallen horse, and threw Mr. Poulsom out on to the track. Neither of the men or the horses was hurt. Stevens' herse took the heat, with Carl's horse, of Coboconk, second.

Mr. John Brock, of Ops, judged the heavy horses, and Mr. Darsh of Lindsay, the light horses; Jas. Casey, of Valentia, the cattle; Wm. Thorndyke, of Oakwood the sheep and swine; and Jas. ### Examiner Road Race...

With the drawing near of Thanksgiving Day comes the announcement that? the sixth annual senior road-race for: the championship of the Midland Counties, and the fith annual junior road-racefor the same district, will be held at Peterborough under the auspices of the Peterborough Examiner on the morning of Thanksgiving Day, Monday, October the 30th. No more successful sporting events are held anywhere in Eastern Ontario than these two big races, which have become very popular on account of the policy which has been carried out of fair play and good treatment to every contestant. The strict adherence to the rules and the impartial and fair manner in which the events have been conducted have given the Examiner's Thanksgiving day races a firm footing.

The senior Examiner road-rece was inaugurated in 1906, and from the start the event was a success-so much so cided to establish a similar race for juto boys under eighteen wat added.. As with the senior event, the junior contest became popular at once and has been steadily growing in favor.

The distance for the senior race is tenmiles, while the juniors have a course of exactly half that distance. The contestants must be bona fide amateurs, and residents of either Peterborough, Ealiburton, Victoria, Northumberland or Durham Counties, while junior contestants must be under the age of eighteen.

The prizes have not yet been announced, but arrangements are being made to . years. As usual, there will be four prizes in each event, the senior winner holding the Examiner trophy for one year, as well as receiving a handsome individual:
