GERMAN'S DEADLY NEW SIEGE GUN

Fires Huge Bomb Which Does Not Enter Bore---A Destructive Weapon

A destructive new type of siege gun has just yielded satisfactory results to experiments conducted by the German military authorities.

The new gun was constructed by the firm of Krupp. It is an improvement on an idea much used by the Japanese in the siege of Port Arthur, and is designed to aid the advance of infantry storming an entrenched position. At the same time, experiments have been carried out with a new form of hand grenade, which effects much the same purpose.

For long military experts in Germany have been puzzling over the problem of how the long range artillery of an army could render efficient support to its own advancing infantry right up to the trenches of a fortified position. According to present "siege technique" the artillery of an attacking army has to cease bombarding the enemy's entrenchments as soon as the storming infantry gets to close quarters, otherwise the stormers are likely to be shot down by their own guns from the rear.

This cessation of the attackers' bombardment enables the besieged to emerge from their entrenchments and pour a devastating fire at close quarters into the ranks of the attacking force, which is thus deprived of the support of its own artillery just at the moment when it most stands in need of it. The new gun has been devised to overcome this difficulty.

It has an extremely narrow, unrifled bore, and is of very light construction, easily capable of being carried by two men, and is intended to be carried in the front lines of the advancing infantry. Its most remarkable feature is its projectile, which consists of a round bomb of great diameter loaded with a very powerful explosive mixture. The bomb is of far greater diameter than the bore of the gun which throws it, and is provided with a long stick-like tail which is loaded into the barrel of the gun, its lower end, which is enlarged to a wad or piston-like form, resting on the guncharge at the bottom of the barrel. The bomb itself merely lies on the gun muzzle, quite outside the bore.

On being fired, the trailing stick like tail serves to keep the bomb in its proper direction of flight, and only detaches itself and falls to earth after a certain distance has been covered, leaving the bomb to pursue its course alone.

The experiments have shown that a reasonable precision can be obtained with the new missile up to a distance of 300 to 400 yards, and the bomb itself, which, owing to its large capacity, is capable of great destruction, serves not only to prevent the defence from emerging from their cover, but also to make great breaches in their entrenchments or fortifications.

SHOCKED IN TRAIN SEAT

Passenger in an Electric Grip Burned While Crossing a Bridge

One of the most peculiar accidents ever recorded in the history of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company occurred when Abraham Mender, of East New York, a passenger in a train crossing the Williamsburg Bridge, was nearly shocked to death in his seat by electricity.

Mendor and Nelson Kentor boarded the train in Manhattan and took a seat in an open car. Mendor's feet were on the iron top of a generator box beneath the seat in front of him. The train had reached the middle of the bridge, when Mendor, in illustrating a story he was telling his friend, placed his hands on the metal handle on the back of the seat in front of him. Suddenly his face grew pale, and he ceased talking and began to tremble like a man with palsy. He tried to take his hands from the seat, but could not dislodge them. His feet were also fastened to the generator box by the electric current. While making efforts to free himself he screamed in agony.

Kentor jumped from his seat and grabbed Mendor about the waist, but the electricity held him, too, and he could not let go. The heavy current passing through Kentor made him dance involuntarily and pound the floor with his feet. Rushing to the aid of the two men, George Williams, conductor of the train, seized Kentor, and was also held in the electrical grip. Several passengers finally lined up as if in a tug-of-war, and they, too, were held fast. Then the train stopped and the policemen went about and pulled all the men free from their position, although they, too, felt the force of the shock.

Mendor, who was barely conscious, was immediately taken to the Eastern District Hospital. His feet were found to be badly burned. Kentor was also in bad shape, but after being treated by Dr. Schwartz was able to go home. The doctors said that Mendor would have died in his seat had he been there a few seconds longer.

FATTENING CHICKENS

First Use Insect Powder Liberally and Then Feed

Chickens intended for fattening should be selected as regards size, and only those nearly the same size should be placed together. About the first thing to do with them is to dust them carefully over with insect powder, so as to rid them of vermin. This should be done at least two or three times more while they are being fattened. During the first few days it is just as well not to feed them too much, as they may get over-fed and refuse to eat satisfactorily afterwards. Feed very lightly for the first two or three days, and then gradually increase the feed until by the end of the first week they are eating all they will, three times per day. Never leave the food before them for more than fifteen minutes. From ten to twenty days should be the time required to fatten them, according to the condition in which they were at the time of commencing to feed.—E. C. M. in Canadian Farm.

GIFT OF A DYING TOT

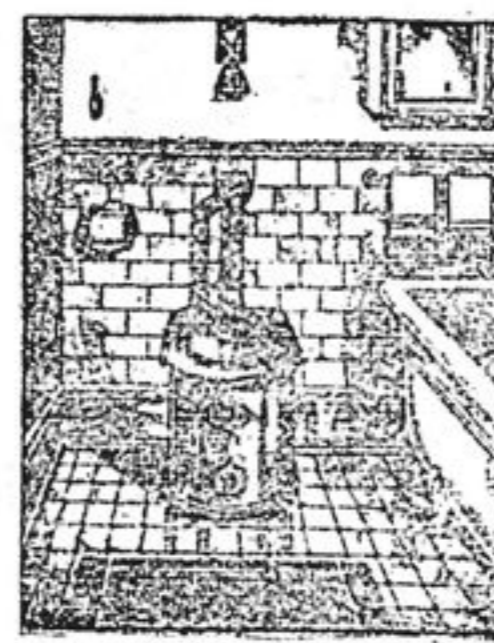
Savings of a Little Child Dying of Tubercular Trouble Goes to Help the Consumptive Poor
