Sketch of the Career of a Typical Western Canadian

Like other prominent Canadian politicians, the Hon. Walter Scyott entered politics by way of journalism, Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself gained much of his facile power of expression during the year in which he edited Le Defricheur, Alexander Mackenzie, the only other Liberal Prime Minister that Canada over had, was also an editor, while the Hon, W. S. Fielding grew politically wise while wielding the editorial pon of the Halifax Chroniele,

A very humble position introduced Mr. Scott to journalistic life, for it was none other than that of printer's devil, The young "devil" rose quickly, He was soon at the "case," and a year or two later saw him mechanical foreman, With mechanical foremanship he combined leader writing, for in those days there were no nice Listinctions between the different deartments of Western newspapers, Ten years after "hitting" the West, Mr. Scott was editor and proprietor
