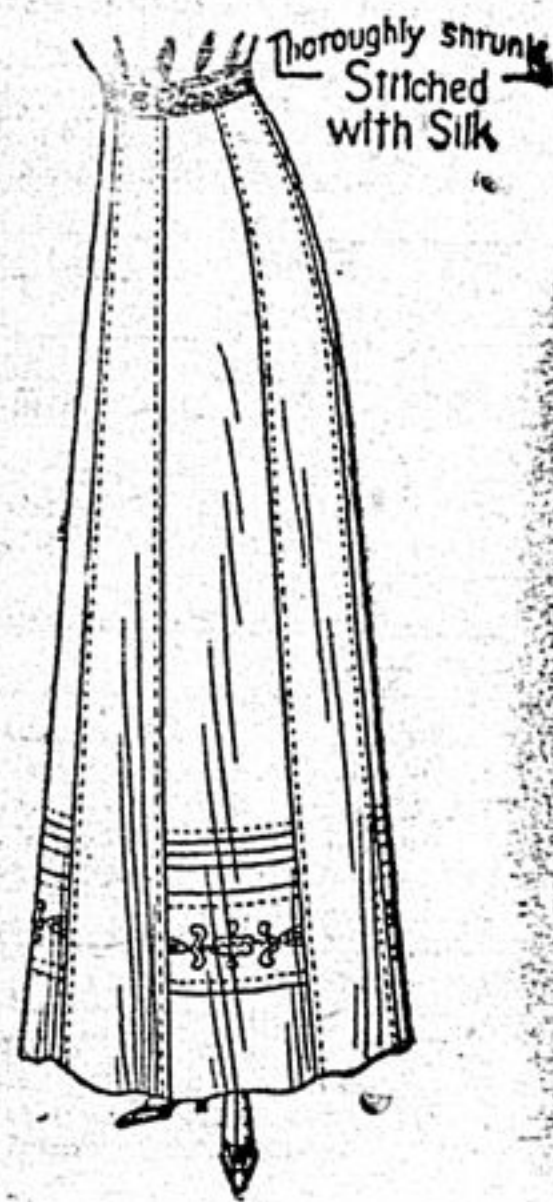

Diehl's Point Case.

The litigation over Diehl's Point on Cameron Lake, which was an action commenced by J. F. Mann and J. H. Brandon against Edward Fitzgerald to recover possession of this Point has been terminated by the judgment delivered by Justice Middleton, and published last week, dismissing the action brought by Mann and Brandon with costs to be paid by them. Fitzgerald is the owner of lot 25 in the 10th concession of Fenelon, which was patented in 1825 to the surveyor who surveyed the township. In the year 1833 Kirkpatrick, the surveyor, conveyed the lot to Peter Diehl, who gave his name to the Point, and it has been called by that name ever since and recognized as belonging to lot 25 in the 10th concession, which is the Fitzgerald property. The Point in question is physically connected with lot 26 in the 10th, which is a lot bought by Mann and Brandon some three or four years ago, and they claim by reason of this physical connection with their lot, and by following the description in the patent from the Crown of their lot, which they allege should follow the water's edge, the Point would belong to their property, although it had always been recognized for the last forty years as belonging to Fitzgerald.

The controversy was started in March, 1910, when the plaintiffs entered the lands and put up a tent on it for the purpose of holding possession; and the defendant, Fitzgerald, ousted them from the property. The case was tried before Mr. Justice Middleton, who reserved his judgment, which was delivered as stated, dismissing the action with costs.

E. D. Armour K. C. and A. D. Armour of Toronto represented Mann and Brandon, while the defendant was represented by R. J. McLaughlin K. C., and A. M. Fulton.

The action was one in which a great deal of interest was taken in the village of Fenelon as it was necessary to go into the history of the survey of the township and the old field notes, and a number of the oldest settlers were called to give evidence as to the survey and the raising of the water on Cameron Lake which changed the shore line. Some interesting points of law were also involved.

Fenelon Falls Council.

Corbett—Poulson.—That the regular meeting of the council be held on the second Monday of each month.

By-laws appointing auditors and members of local Board of Health were read and passed, and also a by-law extending the time for collection of taxes.

Mr. Worsley tendered his resignation as caretaker of cemetery.

Corbett—Poulson.—That the council advertise for applications for the position of assessor, applications to be received up to six o'clock p. m., Feb. 12, 1912.

Tiers—Poulson.—That Mr. Worsley's resignation be accepted and the same to take effect on Feb. 12th, 1912.

Deyman—Tiers.—That the following accounts be paid and the Reeve sign orders for the same: Election expenses, \$18.00; insurance on market square houses, \$17.00; W. L. Robson, treas. of cemetery, \$10.00; Eli Worsley, caretaker of cemetery, \$7.00; Burgoyne & Son, charity to M. Frisby child, \$3.45; Jno. Jones, salary, \$35.00; Public Library, \$75.00; Hospital for Sick Children, \$5.00; McLaughlin, Peel, Fulton & Stinson, re Shipway by-law, \$24.70; McLaughlin, Peel, Fulton & Stinson, general account re by-laws cement walks, debentures etc 2 yrs, \$61.96; Times Ptg Co., election blanks, \$1.95; B. Fitzgerald, postage account, \$1.20; Bell Telephone, account, 30 c.

Council adjourned.

Kicked by a Colt—Walter Irwin Badly Hurt.

On Saturday evening Walter Irwin, a lad between twelve and thirteen years of age, a son of Mr. Wm. Irwin, who lives near Rosedale, had a piece of his skull driven into and imbedded in his brain by a kick from a colt which he was trying to catch in a field some distance from the house. His screams attracted attention, and he was found in an almost unconscious condition in the field, it is supposed about half an hour after the accident occurred, as the fingers of his right hand were badly frozen and the snow was packed down for a considerable space around in his efforts to get up. Dr. Graham was summoned by telephone, and on arriving found what he at first thought was only a scalp wound, but on examination he discovered that a piece of the skull had been completely broken off and imbedded in the brain. The piece of bone could not be seen, but after careful probing it was located and extracted, requiring a very delicate operation. A portion of the brain, about an eggcupful in quantity, had also to be removed. The piece of bone broken from the skull measured two and one-eighth inches in length by one inch and a quarter in width. At last reports the young man is making very favorable progress.

Death of Wm White.

The citizens were shocked this morning to learn that William White, the well known and highly esteemed traveler for Flavelles' Ltd., had passed away at his residence, Bertie St., after a brief illness.

The deceased gentleman had been on the streets only a few days ago, and was in the best of spirits, conversing with his friends in his usual jovial manner.

Probably no man was better known throughout this district than the late Mr. White. Possessed of a warm Celtic heart, he rapidly made friends, and in his business dealings he showed himself to be a man of probity and honor.

The late Mr. White was born in Tipperary county, Ireland, 56 years ago. He came to Canada about 30 years ago, coming direct to Lindsay. During his residence in town he has been connected with the firm of Flavelles Ltd. He was a kind and affectionate husband and father and leaves to mourn his loss besides his sorrowing wife, three sons and three daughters, William Joseph, of Toronto, Joseph and Patrick Joseph of town, Sister M. Leocadia, of St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterboro, Mary and Agnes Anastasia, of town. Mr. P. White, Lindsay, is a brother of deceased.—Lindsay Post.

Lead Mine in Galway Township.

A smelter is to be installed at the Galway lead mine, where the Union Creek Milling Co., the owners of the property, have about 500 tons of pure lead ready for the smelter.

The smelter will turn out about fifteen tons of pure lead per day, which sells for some \$65 per ton and is entitled to a government bounty of \$1.00 per ton additional.

The lead will be teamed to Kinmount, a distance of about four miles, where it will be shipped by rail.

The old Galway mine was formerly owned by the late Mr. John Barham, who did some developing work, but not sufficient to uncover the rich deposits of lead and silver. A recent sample, weighing about two pounds, contained eighty per cent pure lead.—Peterborough Review.
