Somerville Council.

Council met Jan. 27th, all the members present except the Reeve. On motion Mr. Byrne took the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Hoskins.—McFarlane.—That By-law No. — a by-law to appoint pathmasters, poundkeepers and fenceviewers, be read and passed. By-law read and passed.

Davis.—Byrne.—That Mr. McGregor be heard regarding road. Mr. McGregor asked that the original road allowance be opened between lots 48 and 49 in the Front Range.

McFarlane.—Hoskins.—That the clerk notify Joseph Bowin, the owner of lot No. 48 Front Range, that a by-law will be passed at the next meeting of the council to open the road between lots Nr. 48 and 49 in the front range from the Cobocok road.

Hoskins.—McFarlane.—That Mr. J. Jones be allowed the same for sheep killed by dogs as those already settled with.

McFarlane.—Davis.—That D. Henderson's account for snowplowing the road be filed.

McFarlane.—Hoskins.—That we rebuild the Nicholls bridge. Amendment by Messrs. Byrne and Davis, that the bridge be temporarily repaired. Amendment carried.

McFarlane.—Byrne.—That the reeve and Mr. Suddaby be commissioned to get the Nicholls bridge repaired.

Hoskins.—Byrne.—That the reeve and Mr. Davis be commissioned to get the Crego Creek bridge repaired.

Hoskins.—McFarlane.—That the council adjourn to meet at a call of the reeve.

Council met Feb. 3rd, pursuant to a call of the Reeve.

The Reeve reported that in the opinion of the committee appointed to have Nicholls' bridge repaired, the only way to repair the same would be to have the superstructure renewed; and that in view of the fact that the committee had an offer for renewing the top and replacing all piles that may be found defective as well as making the bridge wider (which is very necessary), at a price not much more than would be the cost of any patching of any use that could be done, he strongly advised the council to give him authority to accept said offer; and on motion of Mr. Hoskins, seconded by Mr. Davis, a by-law was passed giving the necessary authority.

A communication having been received from Mr. D. Engleson, saying he would be unable to accept the position of auditor, on motion of Messrs. Byrne and Davis Messrs. J. R. Mark and N. Q. McEachern were appointed auditors. A communication from the Salvation Army was filed.

McFarlane.—Hoskins.—That the following accounts be paid: E. D. Hand, printing account, \$15.00; A. Morrison, A. Y. Hopkins, John Golden and S. Suddaby, board of health meeting, \$2.50 each; F. McGuire, for statute labor paid and performed, refund, \$2.00.

Hoskins.—McFarlane.—That the council adjourn to meet on Saturday, March 16th.
