The driver's aim should be to manipulate the reins with a light but firm and steady hand. A roll after a hard day's work is

greatly appreciated by the horse. It takes the place of extra feed. The value of salting the work horse regularly is often underestimated by horsemen. It is a good practice to

keep the material before them at all Remember that sudden changes of food may cause colic. New hay, new oats, green corn, etc., are often used. Make the change gradually, and no

harm will result. A horse that is extremely tired should not be given a heavy feed until he has had a little rest. Some feeders act on the supposition that a large amount of feed is what is needed to replace the lost energy. It must be remembered, however, that a horse so exhausted cannot digest food as well as one that is fresh, and, therefore, should be fed accordingly.
