

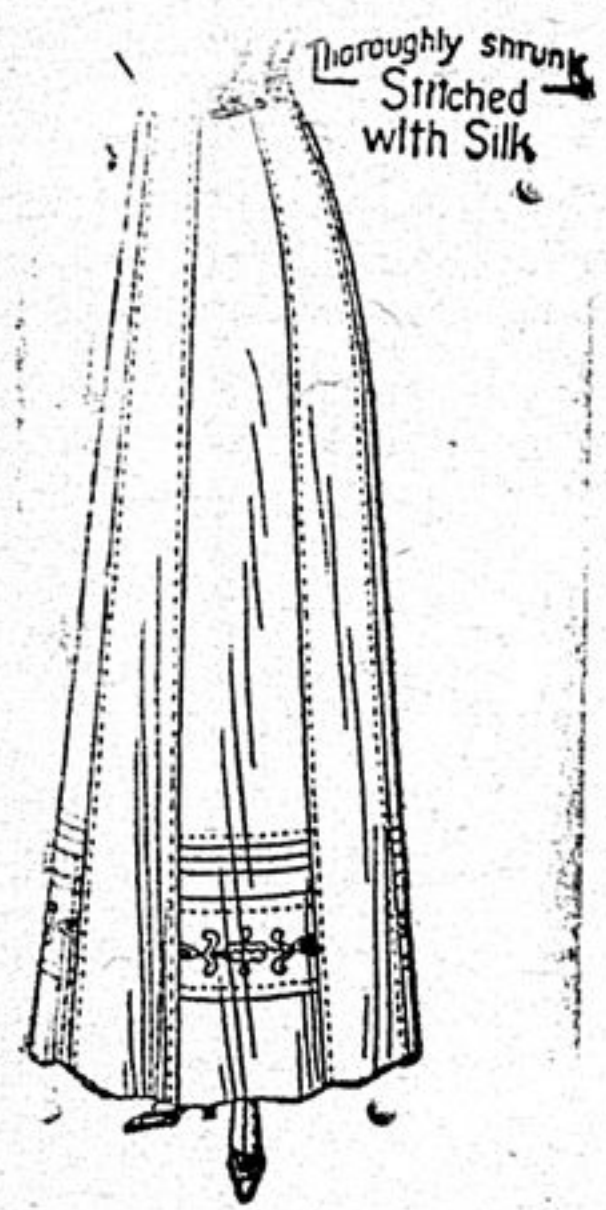

Improved Highways.

Mail and Empire: The reforming spirit that has now turned to the neglected highways of Canada will prove a veritable new magic. In a thousand ways it will greatly change the country for the better. The enthusiasm for good roads is not the transient feeling produced by a novelty or a fad. It is the awakening of a general sense of the true importance of the public highways and the rousing of the public energies to the task of making those highways what they ought to be. The cur:ain has risen on a new prospect in Canada's national life. The good roads movement will have no turning. It will so commend itself that there will be no desire to depart from it, but, on the contrary, there will be a steady assisting of it. Roadway construction will furnish work for armies of laborers in this country during the next twenty years. Roadway maintenance will be a source of permanent employment for other large labor forces. To follow out the manifold benefits that will spring from a system of good roads would be impossible, for benefits will be very numerous, and the tracing of the remotest of them back to the improvement in the roads would be tedious.

Little Britain Hockey Team Wins Fountain Trophy.

In the best game of hockey seen on Fenelon Falls ice for many seasons, Little Britain hockey team defeated the local seven and won possession of the handsome cup donated by the rink manager, Mr. Angus Fountain, last year. Both teams worked hard to win, and the result was a good exhibition of hockey. The score at half time was 3-1 in favor of Little Britain, and 5-4 at the finish. C. Deyman refereed. The Little Britain seven are an evenly balanced bunch, without any weak spots, and by their good behavior and good looks and clean playing won the favor of the crowd to a greater extent than any outside team that ever played at the Falls.

Lindsay always has to make some kind of a squeal when one of its hockey teams is defeated away from home, and especially at Fenelon Falls. If it isn't the box stall or packing-box of a rink that is responsible for their failure to win, it is rough play or an unfair referee or something else. The defeat of the Olympians by the Fenelon Falls seven on Wednesday night calls for the usual tale of woe and accusations of unfair treatment. The truth is that the Kandy Kids were outclassed. Rough play by their opponents or partiality by the referee were not needed, if anybody had any notion of using such tactics to win the game. The home team received its full share of what penalties were imposed, and five of the locals were nursing bruises the next day. The playen objected to by Lindsay as being imported from Peterborough is a regular member of the Fenelon Falls team. As a number of the best men that have ever donned a Lindsay sweater have been natives of Fenelon Falls, the county town fans should accept with a good grace any defeats their teams get in the modest little burg that has supplied them with such good material. There is quite a bunch of it here yet. Perhaps Lindsay thought they had it all.

Very different from Lindsay's lamentation is Little Britain's boast. And more in accordance with the facts. Regarding Little Britain's experience at the tournament the Little Britain correspondent of the Lindsay Post says:

"Our local hockey team have added another victory to their long list of winnings. Last week they journeyed to Fenelon Falls to compete in the tournament for a handsome cup. They returned champions, having defeated Bobcaygeon, Kirkfield and Fenelon Falls. The boys were accorded the best of hospitality while in Fenelon Falls, by the citizens. The rink manager treated the boys excellently. His allowing them the privilege of a practise game on the ice before the game was highly appreciated. The referee was fairness personified. The penalties were dealt out to those deserving such with an impartiality that was very creditable to a local man."
