His mother had set the pan down and on going out for cold water told the little fellow to come with her and not go near the water, but in some manner he fell backwards into the pan. His back was severely scaided. Dr. Ray of Cambray was immediately summoned and all that was possible was done to ease the little sufferer, but death ended his suffering at about eight o'clock the same evening. Howe's Circus a Good One.

The circus has come and gone and with it a considerable portion of the public's hard eash and greenbacks.

A great deal of excitement prevailed throughout the city yesterday, but the nucleus of all the interests was Walsh's field where the tents of the Howe's London Circus were pitched, and where three distinct performances were given yesterday,

Probably a circus never met with more enthusiastic reception and in the afternoon it required two performances to accommodate the crowd. Again last night the tent was taxed to its full capacity and the attendance was given a splendid performance which was kept up continuously during two hours.

The circus was not of the proportions of the old Barnum Bailey combination, but for its size it was well and systematically conducted and all who attended it were well pleased.

The public were courteously attended to and everything was done to accommodate and comfort all comers, the circus people exerted themselves to see that everybody should see the show in comfort. They were especially kind to the members of the local press and spared no pains to show and explain everything relative to the circus.

The various performances in the main tent were most interesting and many of them were nnsurpassed even by the largest shows that have travelled here. Among the most notable were the Eddy Troupe of wire performers, the Royal Japanese acrobats, the dancing horse and the bounding jockey act, all of which were unsurpassable, the latter rider being one of the best ever seen here. healthy looking, showing good care. After the performance last night the circus grounds were readily cleared and the lumbering vans pulled by well-fed grey horses left the circus grounds for the C. P. R. station, bound for Three Rivers, where they perform to-day.

There is at least a prospect of having the date for holding municipal elections changed in Ontario. The municipal committee of the Legislature has decided to report favorably the bill to change the date of polling to the the first Monday in December and it is to be hoped it will be carried into law. Ontario is the only province in the Dominion that wages its municipal election campaigns -some of them bitterly personal-in the height of the Christmas season, when the spirit of peace and good will should prevail. The season is also the basiest of the year, when everybody's mind is occupied with something else besides municipal finances and administration.

Several convictions have already been made under the new amendment to the Liquor Act, which makes it an indictable offence for any person to be found intoxicated in a local option municipality. The minimum penalty is twenty dollars and costs or one mouth in jail. By another amendment to the Act pay checks will not hereafter be legal tender over the bar or counter in a liquor shop, and hotel keepers, or any person on their behalf, are prohibited from accepting for payment of liquor, or converting check or pay check or order for money

issued in payment of wages.

Hotels in local option municipalities are brought under the supervision of the license inspector.



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
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
