COLD STORAGE EGGS

Likely to Supplant LIMEING and Other Preserving Processes

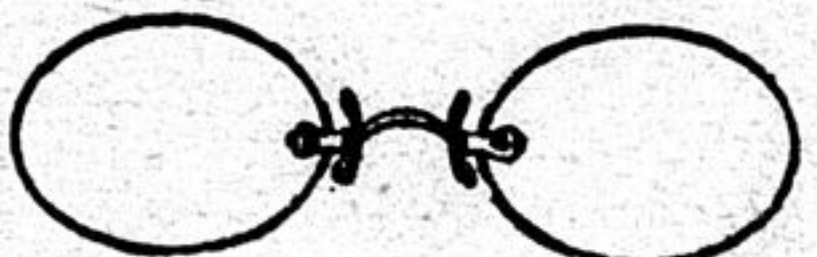
According to Dr. Bordas, of the French council of public hygiene, the cold storage of eggs is rapidly increasing in France, and will soon supplant limeing and the other processes now employed for preservin g eggs. Dr. Bordas insists on maintaining a rigorous distinction between fresh eggs and cold storage eggs, although the latter are very superior to limed eggs. Five, six, or even seven months of cold storage do not appreciably alter the appearance or odor of eggs, while lime water, acting for a much shorter period, makes the albumen slightly yellow and gives the egg the characteristic odor of lime. An egg which has been kept three or four months in cold storage is still in perfect condition to be eaten, soft-boiled, from the shell, but a limed egg of the same age is unfit for this use. After the fourth month of cold storage the air space of the egg becomes enlarged by evaporation, but the egg is still perfectly fit for pastrymaking and most culinary uses.

FLOWER POTS

The value of flower pots depends on the uses to which put, their hardness, and ease with which handled, and when not in use stored. Then it is so easy to obtain them in so many diverse sizes from three inches across the tops, to others 18 to 20 inches. As a rule the amateur gardener finds the most useful to be four-inch, five-inch and six-inch broad. It is well in purchasing to obtain pots in several sizes, as all, if not too large, are wanted for various descriptions of plants. It is well when using new pots to dip them in water for a moment and then let them stand to drain before using, as otherwise being so dry they are too absorbent. In the case of old pots all should be well scrubbed in hot soda water and dried before using. A dirty pot should never be used.

HOW TO KEEP CUT FLOWERS

Choose flowers that are not quite fully out and cut them early in the morning, with four inch stems. Arrange them not too close together in a vase deep enough to immerse two thirds of the stems. By previously putting some pieces of charcoal in the vase the water can be changed every five or six days. Keep the vase always full of water. Keep the flowers in a cool but not draughty place. Certain flowers do much better if a small portion of the stem is cut off, especially if they have been carried a long way, and a certain number are better for slicing the stems up, so as to let them absorb the water more easily. This is especially so with flowers that are apt to go off quickly.—Gardening Illustrated.

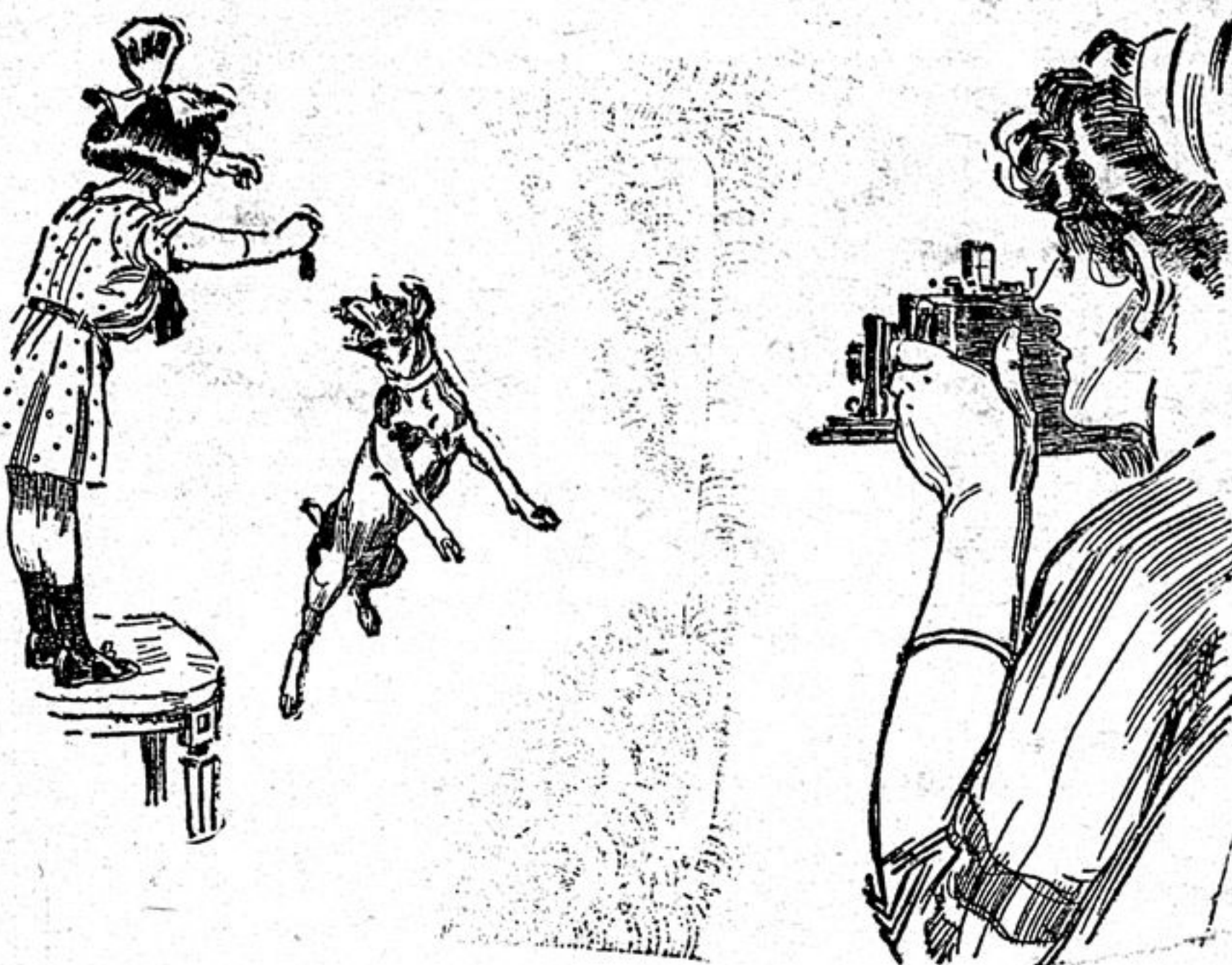
