

## ARCHBISHOP McNEIL

Archbishop McNeil, the new Archbishop of Toronto, was born in Cape Breton on the 23rd of November, 1861. He was ordained priest on the 12th of April, 1879, and was consecrated Bishop on the 20th of October, 1896, at Antigonish, but for the Diocese of St. George's, Newfoundland. He was nominated Archbishop of Vancouver on the 14th of February, 1910. His education was received at the College of the Propaganda in Rome, where he took his doctorate. When he returned to Nova Scotia he was made professor and afterwards rector of the Novitiate of the College of Antigonish, where he did splendid work in education, until he was taken away to be made Bishop of Newfoundland. The Apostolic Prefecture to which he was appointed in the Diocese of St. George's is one of the poorest and least organized of the eastern dioceses, and where he did wonderful work with the means at hand, so when the diocese was changed from Victoria to Vancouver, and a new Archbishop was looked for, the Holy See, looking about for a man outside of the holy orders of the Oblates, who had control of that country, selected Bishop McNeil. His appointment to the archiepiscopal see of Toronto was therefore merely a transfer of diocese.

## VICTORY FOR DICTAGRAPH

The Senate Believed it Recorded About Lorimer

The expulsion of Senator Lorimer from the American Senate for bribery is a victory for the dictagraph. It was in this Lorimer case that the dictagraph first attracted attention, for it was operated in a room of the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, upon a young Canadian from Eiora who was being examined by Burns detectives. His recorded evidence was sent to Washington and was a condemnation of Lorimer. The trustworthiness of the dictagraph as illustrated in this instance formed a subject for long debate, Lorimer's friends declaring that it was utterly untrustworthy, and going even to the expense of publishing a costly pamphlet to prove their point. The Senate, however, believed the dictagraph and all the other evidence against "the blonde boss," and so he takes his place with Senator Foraker and drops into oblivion.

## POULTRY INDUSTRY

Great Room for its Development in Canada

A. G. Gilbert, poultry manager at the Central Experimental Farm, in referring to the development of the poultry industry clearly shows that the demand for eggs in Canada has increased much more rapidly than the supply during recent years. In 1902 we exported to Great Britain eggs to the value of \$1,733,242; nine years later, the exports had fallen to less than a value of \$25,000, while the imports in 1911 reached a value approaching \$500,000.

It is pointed out that farmers are not taking full advantage of the high prices offered for strictly new laid eggs at all seasons of the year. The good profits from these are being secured chiefly by specialists who are often at the disadvantage of having to pay retail prices for f. d.
