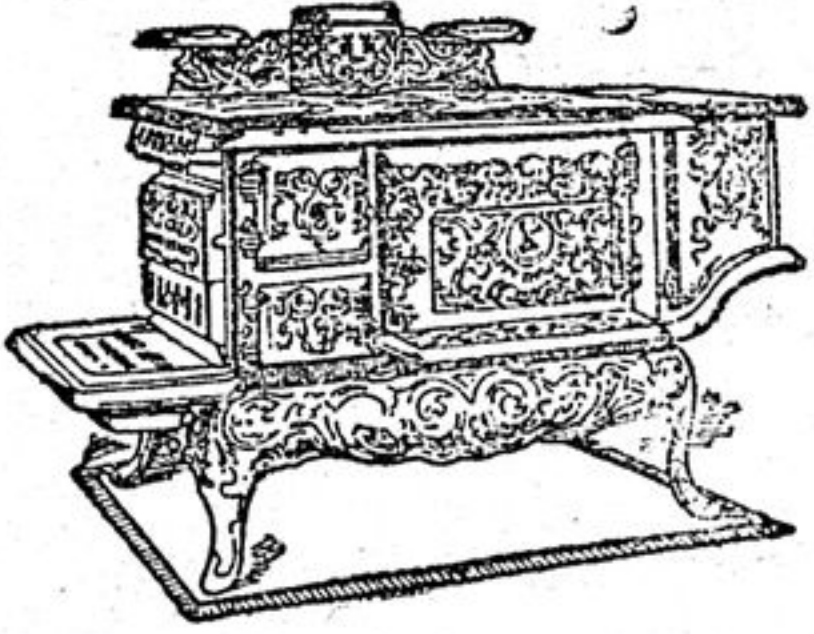

### New Railway for Fenelon Falls.

An advertisement of the Canada Central Railway Co. in another column, for railway ties to be delivered at Fenelon Falls, looks very much like a new railway for Fenelon Falls. This line is the one from Midland to Montreal mentioned a couple of weeks ago in the dailies, a charter for which was granted many years ago. The charter was kept alive, and the line is now to be built.

### Many Hear Local Option Arguments.

Large congregations were present at all the services in the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches last Sunday, to listen to addresses by Rev. Dr. McTavish and Rev. Mr. Farrell on temperance topics, and to hear the singing of Master Douglas Stanbury, the noted boy contralto. There was also a large attendance at Dickson's hall. Dr. McTavish dealt principally with the familiar objections to local option. He Dr. McTavish pointed out, with regard to enforcing the law, that there is the same machinery to enforce it that there is to enforce the license law, and it can be enforced as well as the license law. As to blind pigs, there are more of them in license districts than in local option municipalities. In Simcoe county one sold liquor illegally for sixteen years before local option was passed. As soon as local option came into force this man was discovered and punished and compelled to stop selling liquor. It is nonsense to say there is as much or more liquor sold under local option than under license. A man with a package of sugar in one pocket, a can of sardines in the other and a herring up his sleeve will not sell as many groceries as a store on the main street. Regarding the loss of money from licenses Dr. McTavish stated that the consumption of liquor per head in the Dominion is \$11.30 per head, which would mean an expenditure of over \$11,000 for the population of Fenelon Falls, money worse than wasted, and making the amount received from licenses look very small.

The singing of Douglas Stanbury, who was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Stanbury, was much enjoyed by the large audiences at all the meetings. At the close of the meeting in Dickson's hall a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speakers, Mrs. and Master Stanbury and others who assisted.

### Fenelon Falls Council.

Regular meeting of the Council was held on Monday, Nov. 11th. All members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last regular meeting read and confirmed.

A delegation consisting of Dr. Gould and the Rev. C. S. Lord presented a petition signed by Mrs. T. H. Robson and 114 others asking that a by-law be submitted to the ratepayers prohibiting the sale of spirituous and fermented liquors in the village of Fenelon Falls. The petition was laid over until next regular meeting, when it will be acted upon.

### Institute Meetings and Stock Judging Course.

Friday and Saturday, Nov. 29th and 30th, are the dates of the annual Farmers' and Women's Institute meetings and stock judging course at Fenelon Falls for 1912. The speakers are Miss G. Gilholm of Bright, Mr. J. Gardhouse of Highfield and Mr. J. C. Stewart of Dalmeny. The regular Institute meetings will be held on Friday, and the stock judging on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning and afternoon. Full details are not yet available, but will be published in a few days.

### Memorial to General Booth.

The members of the Salvation Army are now actively engaged, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, in securing the necessary funds towards the establishing of a Memorial in Canada to the late General William Booth. It has been decided by the leaders of the Army in this country that a new Training Institution should commemorate the life and work of the honoured Founder of the Organization.

This is to be erected in the City of Toronto, the centre of all Salvation Army operations in the Dominion, in which the young men and women who offer themselves as Officers could be thoroughly and efficiently trained for their life's work.

It is the intention to provide accommodation for 125 persons, including Class Rooms, Libraries, Sleeping Rooms, Dining Rooms, Kitchen, Hospitals, Baths, Swimming Pool, Gymnasium, Offices, etc. The expenditure necessary is estimated at \$250,000, and while this may appear a very large amount, the money would be well spent, as it will be an investment securing very beneficial results for the future.

At the moment, the Army is handicapped in their Training operations, inasmuch as the accommodation of the present Training College is considerably overtaxed; the idea, therefore, of this Memorial is not only one of sentiment, but of necessity.

The Local Representatives desire to enlist the practical co-operation of all the admirers of the late General, who was truly a benefactor of humanity, and of whom in his lifetime it was said: "The poor thy clients, and Heaven's smile thy fee."

One beautiful Sunday morning in the month of August, about the year 1880, quite a number of boys from the Corner went to Sturgeon Lake for a bath. It was the custom to go every Sunday morning. Sometimes a rowboat was used, and on the Sunday morning mentioned a few of the boys were propelling the boat near the mouth of Robe's creek, when to their astonishment they saw a human body lying a few inches below the surface of the water. The thought flashed into the minds of those in the boat that it was no other than Andy Miller, and investigation showed this to be the case. It was supposed that on the previous Saturday he had been to Fenelon Falls, had become intoxicated, and when coming home had stood up to steer his boat into the creek, had fallen out and went down to a watery grave. Will the citizens of Fenelon Falls just stop and think of the awful curse the liquor traffic is, think of that heart broken woman as she gazed upon that silent form, her only support in life, snatched away from her by that awful curse. Let no person rest day or night until it is outlawed. Some of the readers of the Gazette can remember the Quebec and Ottawa House that was burned. One of our neighbors came out of that hotel, and thought he was on his way home, and staggered into the mill-race, and went down to a drunkard's grave. Another case could be mentioned to prove three cases of manslaughter.
