BY-LAW NO.

A By-Law to prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in the Municipality of the Village of Fenelon Falls.

The Municipal Council of the Village of Fenelon Falls, hereby enacts as fol-

1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured
liquors is and shall be prohibited in
every tavern, inn or other house or place
of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by
wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in
every shop or place other than a house
of public entertainment in the said municipality.

2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Village of Fenelon Falls will be taken on this By-law by the deputy-returning officers hereinafter named on Monday, the Sixth day of January, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirteen, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing until five o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:

Polling Sub-division No. 1, at Twomey's Hall; Deputy Returning Officer, Edward Fitzgerald; Poll Clerk, Walter Jordan.

Polling Sub-division No. 2, at Jordan's

Hall; Deputy Returning Officer, Charles W. Burgoyne; Poll Clerk, Alvin J. Gould. 3.—That on the Second day of January A.D. 1913, at the Council Chamber at the Village of Fenelon Falls, at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon, the Reeve shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law.

4.—That the Clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Village of Fenelon Falls shall attend at the Council Chamber in the Village of Fenelon Falls, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon on the Seventh day of January A.D. 1913, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5.—This By-law shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of May next after the final passing thereof. Read a first and second time this Ninth day of December, A.D. 1912.

HIS NARROWEST ESCAPE

Mr. F. C. Selous, the famous sportsman, tells an exciting story of the narrowest escape he ever had from death. In 1878 he, with three other hunters, encountered a herd of elephants close to the Umbila River. "This herd," says Mr. Selous, "numbered some seventy or eighty animals, of which we killed twenty-two of the largest tuskers. ABOUT MEERSCHAUM

Meerschaum is not, as some people imagine, the foam of the sea, but is a soft, soaplike stone, which is mined like coal. In Asia Minor its mining is an important business. Pits are first dug, and so soon as a vein of meerschaum is struck horizontal galleries are laid out. These galleries are often very long, and they vary in depth from 25 to 150 feet. The crude meerschaum, which is called "hamtash," is yellowish white in color, and a red clay envelopes it. The blocks are sold on the spot at from \$25 to \$200 a cartload according to their quality. They are then soft enough to cut with a knife butt hey are dried before being exported.

A Walking-Stick Farm

A walking-stick farm has been established in Surrey, England. Instead of the cornfields, pastureland, and root-crops usually expected on a farm, the walking-stick acres present the appearance of long, neat rows of tiny sapling trees, some four years old, others younger.

Quite a forest of walking-sticks may be produced in four years; but the handle occasions some delay. To obtain a right-angled handle, the growth is pegged down along the ground, and from this the sapling shoots yerically upwards.
