BY-LAW NO.

A By-Law to prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in the Municipality of the Village of Fenelon Falls.

The Municipal Council of the Village of Fenelon Falls, hereby enacts as follows:

1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house or place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.

2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Village of Fenelon Falls will be taken on this By-law by the deputy-returning officers hereinafter named on Monday, the Sixth day of January, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirteen, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing until five o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:

Polling Sub-division No. 1, at Two-mey's Hall; Deputy Returning Officer, Edward Fitzgerald; Poll Clerk, Walter Jordan.

Polling Sub-division No. 2, at Jordan's Hall; Deputy Returning Officer, Charles W. Burgoyne; Poll Clerk, Alvin J. Gould.

3.—That on the Second day of January A. D. 1913, at the Council Chamber at the Village of Fenelon Falls, at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon, the Reeve shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law.

4.—That the Clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Village of Fenelon Falls shall attend at the Council Chamber in the Village of Fenelon Falls, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon on the Seventh day of January A. D. 1913, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5.—This By-law shall come into force and take effect as from the first day of May next after the final passing thereof. Read a first and second time this Ninth day of December, A. D. 1912.

NEW FISHING LAWS

White Men to Have Chance to Compete Against Japs on Coast

An important change in the fishery regulations of British Columbia decided upon by the Dominion Government, has for its purpose the building up of a white fishing community on the Pacific Coast. In the past Japanese fishermen have almost wholly ousted white men from the industry. Hitherto a given number of boats were allowed to operate in each fishing area and these have been assigned to the different canneries, the arrangement dating from a time when there were practically no resident fishermen in the several districts, so that the canners had to find fishermen and convey them to the different fishing areas. This arrangement in practice worked out into the employment of Japanese. Conditions have changed and it now is expected that under suitable regulations white fishermen will settle permanently in the region affected. The course decided upon was:

1. To apply the boat rating to the water areas and not to the canneries.
2. To issue the licenses hereafter for the fiscal year, beginning with April 1.

3. To reserve until March 15 each year as many licenses in each area as there is reason to expect will be applied for by bona fide white fishermen, leaving their own boats and gear, and to assign the remaining boats allowed to the existing canneries, pro rata the present boat rating.

The licenses to white fishermen allow the to fish independently of any cannery and sell their catches to whom they choose.

ROMANTIC DAYS PAST

Wrong Ideas Engendered in Minds of Youthful Would-be Canadians

Sir Robert Baden-Powell inspected a Boy Republic at Wadhurst, in Sussex, where a lot of Boy Scouts are studying farming with a view to coming to Canada. On the occasion of his visit the boys elected a mayor, gave an exhibition of scouting work, and a Wild West performance.

It is to be feared that a dime novel idea of Canada is being encouraged in these young fellows, and that some disappointments are in store for them.

There is not much scouting to be done out here nowadays by young fellows on the farms. Beyond the occasional necessity for tracing a stray steer along a side line or Sherlock Holmesing along a fence to find a hole that a pig got through, there is not much doing in that line, and usually the farmer does it himself and leaves the youthful hired man to milk cows or chop feed.

All these romantic ideas and circus stunts may help in inducing boys to come to Canada, but it cannot be a good thing for Canada to land here a lot of young fellows who are going to be disappointed in every experience they encounter. There are fine openings in Canada for young men. But this is no fairyland, no land of romance. It is a country where everybody works as people work scarcely anywhere else in the world.—Toronto Star.
