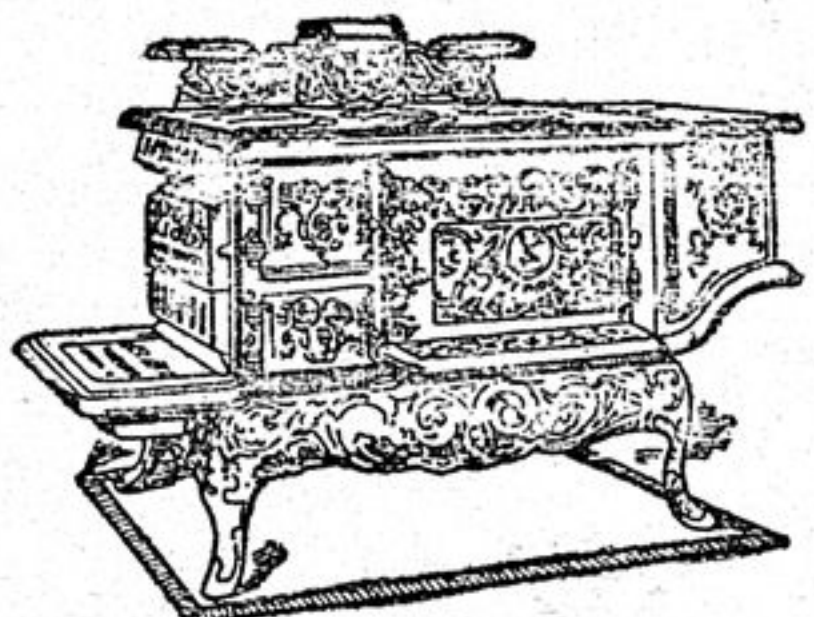

### NEW RAILWAY SEEMS CERTAIN.

Canada Central Directors to Visit Fenelon Falls Next Week.

On Wednesday Reeve Tiers received from Mr. C. N. Armstrong, Vice-President of the Canada Central Railway, a communication stating that the Canada Central Railway Co. had commenced the construction of its line from Montreal to Midland, and proposes to build an extension from Orillia to Goderich, and is applying to parliament for the said extension and asking for the ordinary subsidies. The Company has before the Government a proposal to give running rights to the Intercolonial from Montreal to Midland and the other extensions of the Company's system in Ontario, namely, to Toronto and Port Stanley on Lake Erie. The Company desires a public meeting at Fenelon Falls, at which directors will be present to lay the matter before the public.

The Reeve and members of the council and a large representation of business men met on Tuesday evening, when Mr. Armstrong's letter was read and discussed, and steps were taken to arrange a date for the public meeting. As the presence of the parliamentary representatives of the riding at the meeting was requested by Mr. Armstrong, Col. the Hon. Sam. Hughes was wired, and when his reply is received a date will be fixed. Dr. Mason is now in town, and will attend the meeting.

### Parcels Post.

Now that the United States has adopted and commenced to operate successfully a parcel post service, Canada shares with Spain the rather melancholy distinction of being the only countries of any account in the northern hemisphere which have failed to provide that important public convenience. Even Mexico and many states of Central and Southern America have parcel post systems, and yet with all the accumulated mass of evidence so clearly showing their value and advantages wherever they have been established, the government of the progressive Dominion of Canada has not yet got beyond the stage of "watching with interest" the working of the United States service.

In an article in the current number of The American Review of Reviews, Mr. Richard Florence points out that the Russian post-office will carry a twelve pound package from St. Petersburg across Siberia to the furthest corner of the Island of Saghalien, or of Russian Manchuria, a distance of more than 1,500 miles, for less than a dollar. Turkey engages to forward by mail parcels weighing as much as eighty-eight pounds, and even China and Japan have up to date and efficient package service.

In Canada, as happened to the United States, it is the railway companies and their subsidiary express companies that are opposing the introduction of a Dominion service. Mr. Florence observes that the parcel post par excellence is found in the countries that control their railway systems or portions of them. In Germany, Austria, Hungary, Belgium, Switzerland, Russia and Columbia, the post-offices will carry packages weighing one hundred pounds or more. If it is opposed that the rural mail service of Canada is not sufficiently organized, that is no reason for withholding the service from the settled districts. The parcels post can be easily extended to rural mail routes as these are formed.

[Since the above was in type the announcement has been made that action will be taken at the next session of the Dominion parliament to establish a parcels post system in Canada, and that there is a possibility that the system may be inaugurated within six months.]

### Local Option Defeated.

Local Option was defeated in Fenelon Falls on Monday last by the narrow majority of one and one-fifths votes. There were 171 ballots cast for the measure and 117 against it. The result is very disappointing to the Local Option workers, who had good hopes of winning the contest this year.

Mr. A. Tiers was elected reeve of the village by a vote of 156 to 138 over Dr. Gould. Messrs. L. Deyman, W. H. Robson, S. Corbett and F. C. Taylor were the successful candidates for council. Messrs. R. M. Mason, M. W. Brandon and M. H. McCallum were elected for school trustees. Following are the figures:
