Cost of Big Bullets

The Hadfield Steel Foundry of Sheffield was awarded a contract for five hundred twelve-inch shells for the United States navy at a price of \$187 each. The contract was given to an English firm because its price was lower than that of American tenderers, who, however, were awarded contracts for 5,000 shells, at prices varying from \$279 each for 12-inch to \$430 and \$500 each for 14-inch. Besides showing that Englishmen are still in the steel business, the incident throws some light on the cost of modern war equipment. Five hundred dollars is a lot to pay for one bullet.
