LEAVE IRON CHURCH

Anglicans at Victoria Abandon Old Landmark of Pioneer Days

A notable event in the history of the Anglicans in the west is the passing of the old "Iron Church" of St. John, at Victoria, B.C. The building which the congregation left for a magnificent new Church of St. John, is indissolubly connected with the memory of that charitable woman, the Baroness Burdett-Coutts. She it was who presented the Church, the iron pieces of which were brought to the west by Bishop George Hills, who travelled around the Horn and arrived in Victoria only to find that the Hudson's Bay Company had been before him and had built a church on what is now known as Cathedral Hill, and which had received the dignified title of Cathedral.

The bishop thereupon surrendered the church for parochial purposes. A lot was bought from the Hudson's Bay company for the small sum of about \$200. Recently the same site passed back into the hands of the Hudson's Bay Co., but this time for the slightly different sum of \$150,000.

The sacred edifice was consecrated by Bishop Hills on September 13, 1860, receiving the name of St. John the Divine. The first rector of the church was Rev. R. J. Dundas, who remained in charge from 1860 to 1865.

WORKERS FOR CANADA

Suggested They Stay Here Only for Summer—Vague View of Winter

That a partial solution of Canada's labor problem may be found in sending to the Dominion large numbers of workmen from Great Britain who would work during the spring and summer and return to the Old Country in the winter, is the belief of Sir Charles Hunter, M.P., as expressed after returning home from a trip to Canada.

The Canadian winter is still a bug-bear to many people in Great Britain. Sir Charles is quoted saying that for five or six months the thermometer is down to 35 to 40 degrees below zero, and that the cold is almost intolerable, especially to women.

Seven Hundred Pounds of Mud

Calgary and Edmonton, the two principal cities of the Province of Alberta, are 220 miles apart but that fact tells nothing of the difficulty of making the trip in an automobile. H. H. Kerr, of Calgary, states that on his arrival at Edmonton in a car driven from Calgary more than 700 pounds of mud were scraped and washed from the wheels and axles. Mr. Kerr had four heavy men and a quantity of baggage with him but his car pulled through with no trouble in spite of the fact that she was "over her hubs in the soil" a good share of the time.

No False Fire Alarms

To provide against false alarms an inventor has suggested a fire alarm box that locks a handcuff on the wrist of a person using it, removable only by a fire department officer.

WEALTH OF FORESTS

British Columbia Trees Add Many Millions to Their Value Yearly.

Outside of the agricultural lands, those under water, covered with snow, or still unexplored, it is estimated that there is in British Columbia an area of 66 million acres capable of producing merchantable timber. Mr. R. E. Benedict, of the Forest Branch, stated that the amount of wood annually added to the standing forests through the natural process of growth, is 100 feet per acre. Hence it would appear that 6 1/2 billion feet of timber is being added as interest to the wood capital every year. Mr. Benedict places the value of this growth roughly at \$100,000,000 per annum, but benefits in excess of this amount will certainly accrue. At the present time, when only one-quarter of the annual growth is being cut, the returns to the community are over \$28,000,000 a year.

Gave \$10,000 to Hospital.

Just when the Oshawa hospital trustees were considering ways of extending their institution to meet the demands upon it came the announcement of a gift of \$10,000 by Mr. and Mrs. George H. Pedlar for a new surgical wing in memory of their son, George, who died about two years ago. The gift came as a complete surprise.

Navel Grapefruit.

James H. Gegett, an orange grower of Oroville, California, has two trees which bear navel grapefruit, and will make an effort to make the new citrus product commercially popular. The fruit is a cross between a navel orange and a grapefruit. Steel cages surround the trees to prevent buds from being stolen.
