
Many sewing chairs which women love to use are uncomfortable, despite the fact that they are low and easy

CHICKEN FEEDING

They Can Look After Their Own Wants With This Apparatus


Many amateur chicken farmers are tied down to the home for fear the chickens will have to go hungry if there is no one around to feed them. One brainy chicken farmer devised this fountain feeder which the chickens operate. His chickens have food when they want it, and never is there too much left on the ground to get mouldy and cause ill-health among the flock, and never an evening is there any grain on the ground to tempt rats.

The device is a galvanized iron supply fount which is filled with grain and which has at its base a revolving wheel mounted on extremely sensitive though very strong and durable, bearings.

A light shaft extends down from this wheel to a cylinder made of wire mesh. This cylinder is filled with grain also, but the mesh is so close it cannot fall out. The machine is so mounted that the cylinder is just the height of a chicken's head. The chickens see the grain in the cylinder and peck at it. The slightest touch on the cylinder causes the wheel in the fount to revolve and this throws out grain against an inverted cone which scatters it over the ground. As soon as the wheel stops revolving, and the weight of the grain stops it very quickly, the supply is shut off until another chicken pecks at the cylinder.

Shoe-string Tips

The loss of the metal tips to shoe laces causes no end of annoyance when it is necessary to lace the shoes by passing them through eyelets and as most children's shoes have eyelets such annoyance is pretty general. This can be obviated by securing a piece of fine wire two inches long and massing it through the lacing about



half an inch from the end. The wire should then be twisted around the lacing as far as the cloth or leather goes and then twisted together, the ends being buried in the twist. Treat each end this way and a metal tip is given to the lacing that cannot come

JUDGING MEN'S AGES


Bachelor Claims Young Women Cannot Do It Correctly

NOVEL CHEESE KNIFE

Movable Blades Mounted on Rod That Runs Through Middle

being light in weight, can rest on top of the cheese. When a slice or wedge of cheese is desired it can be cut quickly and accurately by pressing down two of the blades with the requisite width between them. Another advantage of this device, and the probable reason for the third blade, is the fact that it keeps the remainder of the cheese fresh by closing the cuts against the air. The blades are about the depth of the usual round cheese and two of them can be kept pressed against the cuts where the inside is exposed.

HOW ELEPHANTS SLEEP

In One Sense Are Lightest Sleepers Scidom Lie Down

Whether elephants ever lin down a question which nature students s in doubt about. One authority. Gord Cumming, made known the fact it at one time he thought he had for evidence in marks on the groun that the bulls of one herd d'd strete hemselves out at full length for few hours' rest at about midnight, bu says Harper's Weekly, he contends that the young and the cows alwayremained on their feet.

Another authority, Selous, has expressed doubt whether even the old bulls lie down. He tells of one herd that was known to have kept moving and feeding throughout the twentyfour hours. "Except when rolling in mud and water," he says, "it is likely that an African elephant never lies down during his whole life."

However this may be, the most competent authorities seem to agree that this animal sleeps less and more lightly than any other. J. L. Kipling, the father of the writer, has estimated the period of slumber taken standing up to average about four hours in the twenty-four, and his estimate has been employed by the son in an amusing passage for one of his stories, "Moti Guj," wherein the sleep of the elephant is represented as consisting of an hour's fidgeting on one side and a similar period on the other, followed throughout the rest of the night "by long low, rumbling soliloquies."

The Growth of Buenos Ayres

Of all the great cities. Buenos Ayres is said to be growing the most rapidly. The most artistically built of the cities of the new world, it reminds the visitor of Madrid or Paris. This magnificent capital of the Argentine Republic had in 1800 only 40,000 inhabitants; in 1852, 76.000; in 1865, 187,000; in 1887, 429,000; in 1895, 555,000; in 1904, 951,000; the census of 1910 brought it up to 1,282,117 while the population since that time has grown astonishingly. The Mayor, in a recent public speech, said that in four years the population of Buenos Ayres, at the present rate of growth, would surpass that of Paris.
