### Capitalism a Social Disease.

When we look about us to-day and see the gigantic fortunes which are being amassed by the few, the determined greed of those in power to usurp the wealth produced by the many, the ever increasing want of the producing class, the extreme poverty of the producers of all wealth, and who would naturally, if not restrained by some mercenary force, share most abundantly of all in the choicest material needs of life, we cannot help but wonder at the gentle forbearance and meekness of the poor. We are astonished that they will continue from year to year to accept the scantiest pittance of all their sweat and toil has brought forth from the inexhaustible storehouse of nature. We marvel at their being beguiled into believing it is God's will, who has blessed them so abundantly in creation, that they shall receive the mere pittance their masters grudgingly dole out to them. Just as though God is responsible for the little which they receive, and that it was by some mysterious decree of the Almighty that they should labor hard and long hours daily to support a horde of worthless parasites in wasteful luxury, to sit as rulers and judges over them. There is no law, either natural, moral or spiritual, to forbid or prevent mankind collectively from making such distribution of the wealth their labor has produced as may seem best fitted to meet the individual and collective needs of all.

We used to hear of the independent farmer in the more primitive stages of progress, when by his own hands he produced the principal necessities for his subsistence, but under our modern method of production he is as much a slave to the powers in control of the machinery of production and the facilities of distribution as the man who plants the powder charges to blast the ironstone for the smelter, guides the weaving loom, or puts the last finishing touch to complete a pair of factory-made trousers. Whether a farmer grows beef, grain, or the various other farm products, he must first equip himself with machinery. No matter how skilled he is with his own hands, he cannot produce with them alone, and he can only use, in the raw stages, for his material needs, but a very limited amount of what he grows. Hence he must pass the great bulk of the product of his toil to the monopolies controlling manufacture and distribution. These, through the medium of the excessive toll they take from the wealth produced on the farm, are fast crushing out hope and ambition from the farmer, and reducing him to a state of the most abject poverty.

The small farmer is fast being driven to the wall; mortgage foreclosure and sheriff's sales are becoming as

common here in the west as homestead filings were six years ago. Instead of the independent farmers tilling their quarter or half sections, we find them leaving the country and searching for a job in the factory or mine, or sinking still lower and becoming the rent-racked slave of a modern-equipped, hotel-fed landlord. Under this condition of things, is it any wonder that farmers are fast becoming converts to Socialism, and that a little leaven in the form of a few Socialist leaflets or news publications will often regenerate a whole community in a few weeks?—J. Gibson, Sundial, Alta.

### Wake Up!

Tens of thousands of scantily clothed and fed children go to school in these brisk, frosty mornings, whose parents worked hard all the year and have not more to give their darlings. ### Labor Skinners Would Howl.

Coal in Montreal is going to \$12 a ton. Coal is laid down in the yards of the dealers at \$3 a ton. When they sell it at \$8 and \$12 you see how much they get. Workers in the mines get poor wages. You pay more than you can afford, with your poor wages, for the coal you buy. Why is this? Simply to enrich gentlemen who do nothing useful—whose only function is to rob. Would it not be better for the working class to own the mines and handle their own coal? Then the miners would get more for working in the mines, and coal could be sold to consumers at a fair price. This is what Socialism aims at doing, among other things. Of course the private monopolists and labor skinners howl against Socialism. We can expect nothing else.—Ex.
