

BALL PLAYERS AND ICE CREAM

Major league ballplayers as a class are about as free from the ordinary weaknesses of the flesh as any body of men in the world.

Before the dinner hour was 45 minutes old, there wasn't a bit of ice cream in the place. The same thing happened the next evening and there was loud walls from the men who dined late because none of their favorite dessert was forthcoming.

Then the steward began to realize that he had a lot of ice cream fends on his hands and the order for this dish was increased to double the supply that would have been needed were the guests less voracious in one particular direction.

Fully ninety per cent. of the Detroit players eat ice cream for one meal a day and about 75 per cent.—these being the real slaves to the food—take it both for luncheon and dinner.

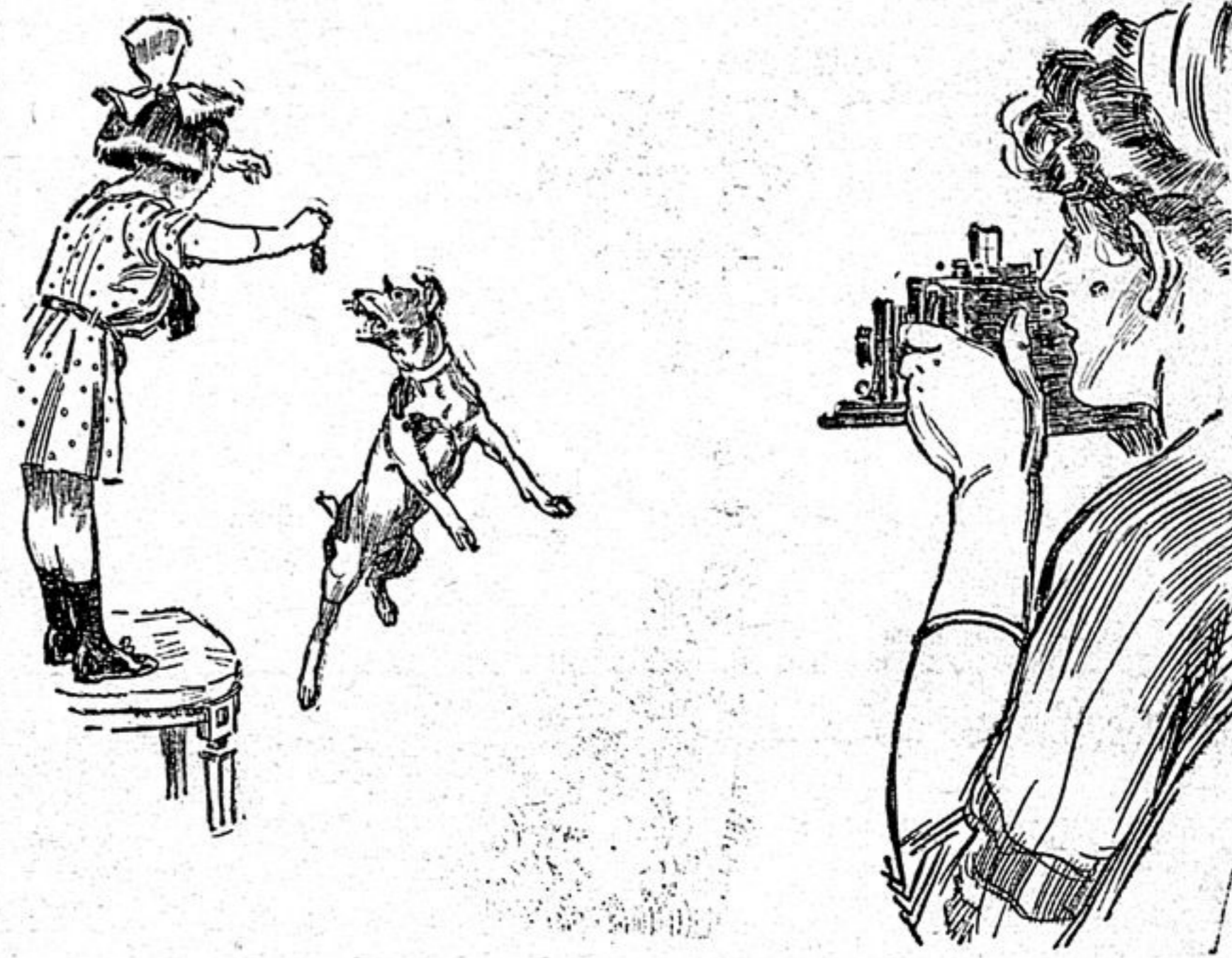
