How do Animals Know?

One of the mysteries still unsolved is that of the sense by which the lower animals become aware of the approach of earthquakes. For three or four days before the severe earthquakes at Guadalajara, Mexico, the many parrots of the city showed great and unusual restlessness, and during the period of disturbance the increased cries of the birds gave warning of the nearness of the worst shocks. Rats, also, became alarmed, fleeing from the city before the earthquakes came. Supersensitiveness to faint shocks hardly gives satisfactory explanation, for modern seismographs are very sensitive, and it is quite unlikely that tremors too slight to be reckoned would be felt so strongly as to give alarm.—"Science Sitings."

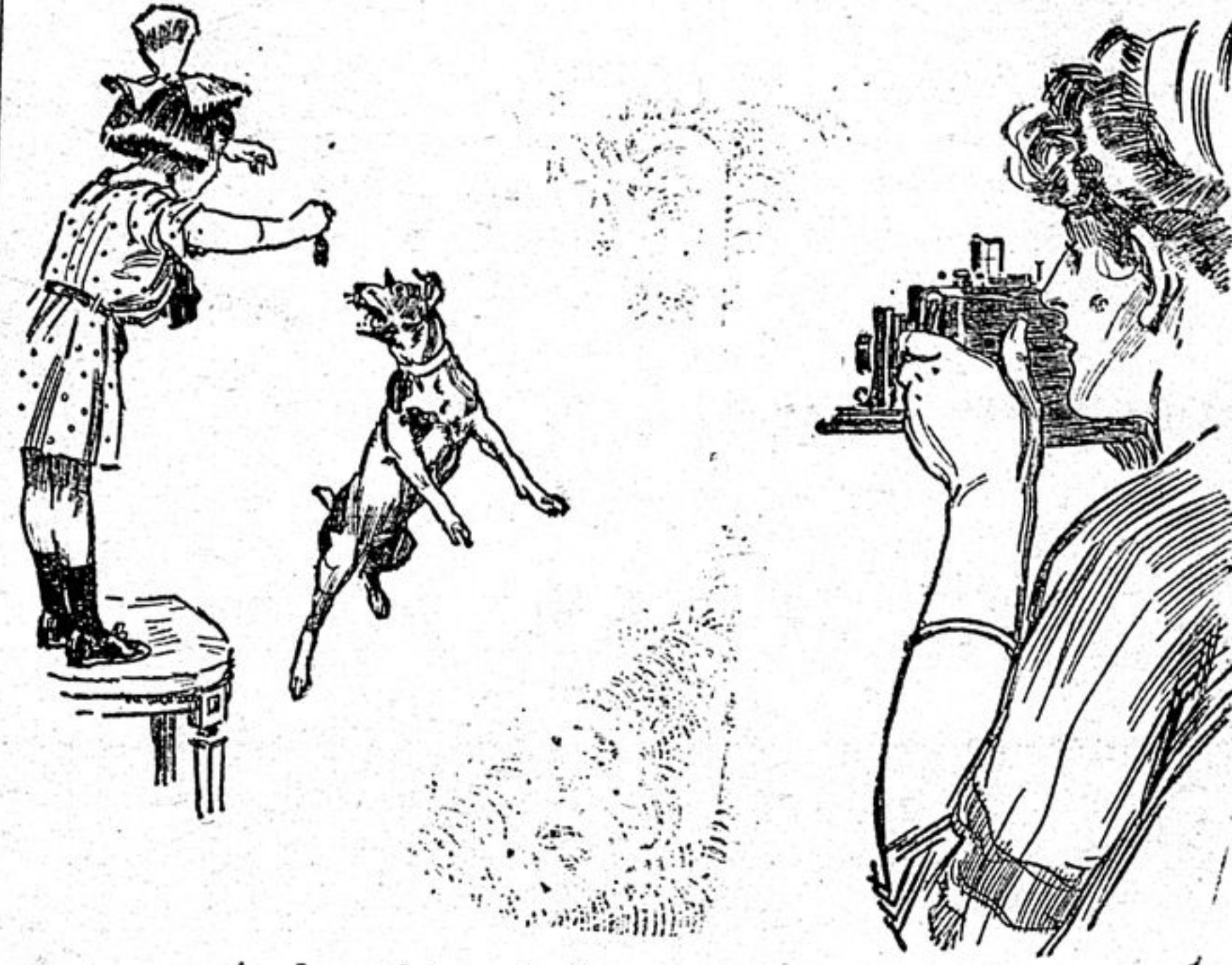
