There is a marked tendency on the | were before. part of the courts to again come to For wage slavery rules and wages struggle that is growing fiercer and while there is a strike, but the strikers are being enjoined by injunctions right far-reaching decisions that have been from Omaha, declaring that cities have no right to engage in business that will protect them from sharks who happen to have acquired franchises; and that the franchise, once granted, becomes in effect a perpetual license to rob the people; that if this robbery cannot be accomplished in the terms of the franchise, then these terms may be stretched to admit of the making of profits. It is not only an unbelievable infamy that such a decision has been made, but it is a direct statement that socialized work is illegal-the first declaration of the kind ever made. This becomes, therefore, a special chal-

lenge to Socialists. Socialists must accept the challenge. We must show that the people are superior to the courts and legislatures which they create; that the fact that they have delegated certain powers to corporations proves that they themselves possess the powers which they delegated to others. The courts must become responsible to the people. The people must have the same right to turn the judges off that every employer of labor reserves toward the man he employs. The courts that are created especially for the purpose of upholding a system of robbery must be entirely abrogated, and the power they have assumed of reading their own opinions into law and of declaring unconstitutional laws regularly adopted must be taken away from them. police powers must be captured and used in the interest of the toilers. We have gone long enough respecting the robbers because the courts they appoint and the officials they control would protect them in their loot. It is time the working people arose to do something for themselves -Appeal to Reason.
