

Verulam Council.

Council met pursuant to statute on Monday, at the town hall, Bobcaygeon, and the following took their declaration of office: J. J. Devitt, Reeve, Councilors Wm. Green, J. Mitchell, Chas. Logan, and D. McFarland.

On motion of Messrs Mitchell and Logan, the clerk was instructed to communicate with Dr. Mason, M.P. P., requesting grants for Devitt's cement bridge and the bridge at Dunsford, opposite lot 4.

On motion of Messrs. Green and Mitchell, Wm. Thurston and T. J. Ingram were appointed auditors.

On motion of Mitchell and Green, Alex. Dunseath was re-appointed assessor.

On motion of Messrs. Logan and McFarland, the assessor's salary was placed at \$65.

On motion of McFarland and Green, the motion fixing assessor's salary was rescinded, and the salary made \$70.

By-law was passed accordingly.

On motion of Green and Logan, a grant of \$5 was made to the Children's Hospital, Toronto.

On motion of Mitchell and McFarland a by-law was passed consenting to the registration of a plan of Thurstonia, with streets less than 65 ft. wide.

On motion of Mitchell and McFarland Wm. Purdy was allowed bonus for 63 rods of wire fence, same to be charged to J. J. Devitt, commissioner.

On motion of McFarland and Logan, J. Southam was granted bonus for 90 rods of wire fence, same to be charged to Wm. Green, commissioner.

On motion of Mitchell and Logan, Jos. W. Taylor was appointed member of Board of Health.

Moved by Mitchell, seconded by Green, that the following accounts be passed:

Applications for assessing the township were received from H. W. Johnston, C. Reid, P. Mark and S. J. McKinnon. On motion of Messrs. Mark and Moynes, H. W. Johnston was given the appointment, salary \$90, he to pay postage.

On motion of Messrs. Smithson and Lee, John Cundal and Percy Mark were appointed to audit the 1913 accounts at \$6.00 each.

On motion of Messrs. Mark and Smithson, a by-law was introduced confirming the above appointments, also the Board of Health for 1914, the members of which are: J. W. Ray, M.H.O.; Reeve Tompkins and Richard Byrnell. The by-law was passed, signed and sealed, Mr. Moynes in the chair.

The following other motions received the assent of council:

Mark-Lee-That Wm. Arksey be appointed constable for Cambury village for 1914.

Lee-Moynes-That the Balsam Grove and Pleasant Valley Telephone companies receive permission to place their poles on the roadsides to Cameron and Fenelon Falls, they to observe carefully the statutes relating to the placing of obstructions on highways.

Lee-Mark-That a by-law be passed at next meeting commuting the statute labor of all parties having summer cottages, and paying the same at \$1.50 per day, also charging the same rate per day to all other parties who wish to commute their statute labor.

Lee-Moynes-That the present wire fence by-law be repealed and another prepared and passed at next meeting of council, embodying among other principles the following:—1st, That the ordinary bonus be 25c. a rod; 2nd, that the bonus be paid for the removal of obstructions to snow, and that only partial bonus be paid where anything interferes with the passage of snow; 3rd, that the bonus be paid only when the work has been passed by someone authorized to inspect it; 4th, that all parties intending to erect wire fence shall notify council on or before August 15th of each year, giving (1) the number of rods, (2) the number of wires in the fence, (3) number of rods not drifted and the number drifted.

Mark-Moynes-That council has considered Jos. Moore's claim for damages to buggy on culvert at Jno. Westaway's gate, and believe that they are not responsible for the same.

Moynes-Smithson-That accounts amounting to \$84.89 be paid.

Council adjourned, to meet at Cameron on first Monday in March.
