### Fishing.

From the Peterboro Examiner.

Conservation and reproduction are the essentials of permanency of supply in almost everything, and they apply as much, if not more, to fishing, as to anything else. Time was when the Kawartha waters were literally alive with fish. It is not so now. Overfishing the waters, that is, illegally legitimate fishing, is one cause of the depletion; but a greater cause is the killing of spawning fish in their season, something like a farmer selling the most of his seed grain. Public-spirited persons are locally circulating, or have circulated petitions to the Ontario Government to provide a fish hatchery for the Kawartha waters. The Government should do this as much as a matter of reparation as in the interests of fish supply. It is the Government's fault; at least, it is responsible for the depletion of our waters. It is held by those who know that one great cause of fish depletion is the neglect of the Government inspectors to enforce the regulations in regard to fishing out of season. We have before us the letter of a gentleman long interested in the fishing of the lakes. After referring to the overfishing by tourists as a cause of lack of fish supply, the writer says that the depletion does not arise so much from this.

"as from the wicked, illegal killing of fish in the spring, when they come up the creeks to spawn. We have been advised that in the creeks emptying into — lake, and in the marshes adjoining the farms, waggon loads of female fish are taken out during this (the spawning) period. Quite recently some interested people in — secured the names of men who were engaged in this work, and it was found, upon investigation, that there were thousands of pounds of these fish salted down."

This cause of fish destruction is largely attributed to the failure of the fishing inspectors to keep vigilant enough watch. It is also suggested that the inspectors should be more alert in seeing that the legal limit of rod fishing is not greatly exceeded, which it is claimed is almost constantly done by too enthusiastic tourists, aided and abetted by guides who know the best fishing grounds, and contribute to catches of illegal number. The causes of depleted fishing waters are controllable. There must be some efficient inspection of places known to be spawning grounds and a closer enforcement of the regulations limiting the catch. If the petitioners for a hatchery urge these points successfully upon the Government they will, if they secure a hatchery, have the knowledge that its benefits will not be neutralized by continued illicit and over-fishing, the two chief causes of the destruction of fish and fishing in our waters.

### Taken to Lindsay Hospital.

One of the islands that adds so greatly to the picturesque beauty of Balsam Lake had as its sole inhabitant Mr. Alfred Greenie. Through some passing trappers, word reached Mrs. Sutherland of Rosedale that Mr. Greenie was seriously ill. She at once, with characteristic kindness, went to the rescue, and telephoned to Fenelon Falls, whereupon Mr. Jones, motored over and found Mr. Greenie in a most precarious condition; so ill, indeed, that while there was food in the house he could not rise from his bed to reach it. Improvising a stretcher, Mr. Jones and his companions carried the sick man to the boat and conveyed him quite comfortably across to the McArthur House, where, having received all needed care, with medical attention, he was transferred on Saturday to the Lindsay hospital. Recent reports state that there is very slight hope of recovery.
