Death of Wm. Hetherington Sr.

One of the oldest and most highly esteemed pioneers of Verulam Township passed away on Tuesday last in the person of Mr. Wm. Hetherington, who died at his residence at Fenelon Falls in his 89th year. Death was due simply to old age, Mr. Hetherington having had the best of health all his life. Deceased was born in Carlisle, Cumberland, England, on January 11th, 1821, and came to Canada in 1851. He spent six years at Peterborough as foreman for Judge Hall, at the expiration of that time coming to Verulam as foreman for Capt. Wallace, and leased the farm now owned and occupied by Mr. Wm. Welch. He afterwards moved to his farm on the fourth concession of Verulam, where he lived until five years ago, when he moved to Fenelon Falls. Mr. Hetherington was married in Peterborough by Rev. Mr. Rogers in the year 1857 to Miss Margaret McGregor, who had come to Canada from Scotland a few years previously. He was a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church, and a regular attendant at St. Andrew's during his long residence here. He is survived by Mrs. Hetherington, seven sons and five daughters. The sons are Isaac and Thomas of Fenelon, David, William and Robert of Verulam, James of Alberta, and Charles of Toronto. The daughters are Mrs. R. Wilkinson, Mrs. J. W. Staples, Mrs. Fletcher Mitchell of Verulam, Mrs. John Bennett of Winnipeg, and Miss E. A. Hetherington at home. Forty-five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren also survive him. The funeral on Thursday to the Fenelon Falls cemetery was very largely attended.

The bride looked charming in a gown of ivory brocaded satin, trimmed with shadow lace and pearls, and carried a bouquet of bridal roses and lilies of the valley. The bride was attended by her sister Vivian, who wore a dress of white embroidered voile and carried a bouquet of pink and white carnations. Mr. A. W. Terrill, brother of the groom, acted as best man. Owing to the recent death of the bride's father, only the immediate relatives were present. After the wedding supper, the happy couple left for an extended trip, the bride travelling in a black suit and hat to match. On their return Mr. and Mrs. Terrill will take up their residence in Fenelon Falls.
