Dr. Mason Re-Elected.

Dr. R. M. Mason was re-elected member of the Legislative Assembly on Monday by a majority of 519 over his opponent, Mr. Thomas Hodgson, the independent Conservative candidate. Dr. Mason's return was generally anticipated, although during the last few days of the campaign some doubts were expressed as to the result of the contest. The meeting at Fenelon Falls on Saturday night made votes for Mr. Hodgson, and when the figures for the town were announced after the poll closed many thought Mr. Hodgson might prove to be the winner. In poll No. 1 the vote stood Mason 71, Hodgson 48; and in poll No. 2 Mason 85, Hodgson 33. Dr. Mason's majority in the riding is 519.

Rockefeller's Vocal Weakness.

From Saturday Night.

William Rockefeller is again sought as a witness. This time the interstate Commerce Commission wants him very much as a witness to enlighten them regarding the looting of the New Haven of millions of dollars. The affairs of the New Haven are being investigated by the commission, and they believe that Mr. Rockefeller could help them materially. At Tarrytown where Mr. Rockefeller is now sojourning, it is stated that he is still unable to speak, never having recovered from the vocal weakness which became prominent in 1912, when the senate investigating committee wanted him to tell about interlocking boards of directorates of Standard Oil Corporations. It is said that aside from his inability to speak, Mr. Rockefeller is enjoying fair health.

Grand Trunk Local Service Improved.

By a change, which went into effect on July 1st, the G. T. R. noon train from the south leaves Fenelon Falls at 11.55 and goes through to Haliburton, instead of stopping at Kinnmount. The train that formerly left Lindsay at 2.40 p. m. has been cancelled or held over, and will leave Lindsay at 8.20 p. m., after the arrival of the Toronto train. South-bound trains leave Haliburton at 6 a. m. and 3 p. m., Fenelon Falls at 8.05 a. m. and 5.10 p. m. This arrangement is in accordance with the proposition made to the Grand Trunk by the Fenelon Falls Board of Trade. It goes into effect for three months, and if found satisfactory will be continued. The success of the service will depend very largely on the efforts of the railway management in advertising it and giving the improved facilities in this division the publicity they deserve in common with other branches of the service.
