Matthie's Fire Escape. Mr. John Matthie of this town has invented and patented a simple and effective fire escape, the working of which he gave an exhibition a few days since at the Benson house, by letting himself down from one of the top story windows with perfect ease and safety. The "machine" fully meets the requisites of cheapness, safety, durability and simplicity, with the important point of being small, light and easily handled. A rope loop goes under the persons arms and is attached to a small frame having two handles. The frame holds a spool round which is coiled a small wire made of several strands of Swedish irea wire. One end of the wire rope is fastened to a hook or spike in the bedroom and the wire rope is played out as the person descends. The playing out of the rope is checked and governed by the handles of the frame held in the person's hands, and which acts as a brake. The wire rope will bear a weight of 600 pounds.
