(b) That the Municipal Council of the the Town of Lindsay shall have the right to appoint one Director of the Company each year, and the Company entering into the necessary agreement therefor.

2. That for the purposes aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said corporation and he is hereby authorized and empowered to cause debentures of the said corporation of the Town of Lindsay to be made, executed and issued to the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars, in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars. which said debentures shall be signed by the said Mayor of the said corporation for the time being, and countersigned by the Treasurer, for the time being, of the said corporation, and duly sealed with the corporate seal thereof.
