By-Law No. 668.

BY-LAW to grant a Bonus of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars to the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool Railway Company in Debentures of the Corporation of the Municipality of the Town of Lindsay.

WHEREAS THE LINDSAY, BOBCAYGEON and Pontypool Railway Company have made application to the Corporation of the Town of Lindsay to grant by way of a bonus towards the completion of their Railway, leading from the Village of Bobcaygeon in the County of Verulam in the said county to the Town of Lindsay, thence on through the Township of Ops in the said County of Verulam to a place near or within ten miles westerly of Pontypool on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the sum of twenty-five Thousand Dollars in Debentures and it is expedient to grant the same.

And whereas for the said purposes it is necessary for the said Corporation of the Town of Lindsay to create a debt to the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars and to issue debentures therefor in the manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas the total amount required to be raised in each year, by a special rate during the term of twenty years to pay the said debt in annual instalments and to pay the interest thereon are the respective amounts set forth in the schedule annexed to this By-Law.

And whereas the amount of the whole debenture property of the said Town of Lindsay according to the last revised assessment roll is the sum of \$1,816,988, less for the year 1892, irrespective of any future increase of the same.

And whereas the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Town of Lindsay is \$190,740, and there is no part of the principal or interest of the said existing debt in arrear.

Therefore the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Lindsay enacts and ordains as follows:

1. That it shall and may be lawful for the Corporation of the said Town of Lindsay to grant by way of bonus to the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool Railway Company, which lies between the Village of Bobcaygeon and Pontypool, as aforesaid, the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars in debentures of the said Corporation upon the following conditions:

(a) That the construction of the said Railway from the Town of Lindsay to the Canadian Pacific Railway shall actually be commenced on or before the 1st July 1894, and the same fully completed and in running order on or before the 1st July 1896, and these conditions are not to prejudice in any way affect a sale of the said debentures.

(b) That the Municipal Council of the Town of Lindsay shall have the right to appoint one Director of the Company each year, and the Company entering into the necessary agreement therefor.

2. That for the purposes aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Corporation and he is hereby authorized and empowered to cause debentures of the said Corporation of the Town of Lindsay to be made, executed and issued to the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars, in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars, which said debentures shall be signed by the said Mayor of the said Corporation for the time being, and countersigned by the Treasurer, for the time being, of the said Corporation, and duly sealed with the corporate seal thereof.

3. The said debentures shall bear date upon the date hereinafter appointed for the coming into force of this By-Law, and shall be payable on the 20th day of December in each year, in the manner, for the amounts and at the times respectively set forth in the schedule to this By-Law, with interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum, payable yearly, on the 20th day of December in each year during the currency of the said debentures, such debentures to have coupons attached for the payment of interest, and the debentures and coupons to be made payable at the Ontario Bank in Lindsay.

4. There shall be raised and levied in each year for the payment of the said debt interest and debentures issued therefor the respective amounts set forth in the schedule hereto.

5. That the said amounts shall be raised and levied in each year, by a special rate thereon on all the ratable property in the Municipality of the Town of Lindsay, during the currency of the said debentures.

6. That the said debentures shall be delivered by the said Mayor, for the time being, of the said Corporation to Edward Hood, A. F. D. McEachen and Robert Ross, of the Town of Lindsay, Bankers, as the trustees appointed by the said Corporation and the said Railway Company, who shall not dispose of the same or convert the same into money except, as hereinafter mentioned.

7. That, subject as hereinafter mentioned, the said debentures and proceeds thereof shall be delivered and paid by the said Mayor of the said Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool Railway Company upon the completion of the said line of railway from the town of Lindsay to the Canadian Pacific Railway, and the same put in running order. Provided the same is commenced and completed within the time herebefore mentioned and provided for and upon the completion of the Municipal Council of the

Town of Lindsay the right to appoint one Director each year as hereinbefore provided for.

8. In the event of the said company failing to commence or complete the said railway within the time herebefore mentioned, and provided for, the said debentures and coupons attached thereto and the proceeds thereof shall at once be returned by the said trustees to the Treasurer of the Town of Lindsay, to be cancelled, and the Council may at once pass a By-Law repealing this By-Law.

9. All interest coupons attached to the said debentures falling due before and those falling due on the 20th day of December following the completion of the said railway from Lindsay to the Canadian Pacific Railway, shall be detached from the debentures, and returned by the said trustees to the Treasurer of the Town of Lindsay from time to time as the same become due, to be cancelled.

10. Any of the said debentures falling due and paid to the said trustees before the said Railway Company becomes entitled thereto shall be retained by them and put out at interest, and the interest therefrom paid to the Treasurer of the Town of Lindsay periodically until the said Railway Company become entitled to the principal.

11. That this By-Law shall come into force on the 30th day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

12. The votes of all the Electors of the Municipality of the Town of Lindsay, entitled to vote thereon, shall be taken on this By-Law on Monday, the 20th day of February, 1893, from nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day at the following places and the following persons shall be the deputy returning officers to take the votes at the respective places.

NORTH WARD.

No 1. Council Chamber, Peter Nicolle, returning officer.

No 2. Skitch's Wagon Shop, R G Corneil, returning officer.

No 3. A W Parkin's office, James Neads, returning officer.

SOUTH WARD.

No 1. Jos Maunders's office, A A J Soane's, returning officer.

No 2. Curling Rink, J M Knowlson, returning officer.

No 3. Dennis' pump factory, Chas O'Leary, returning officer.

EAST WARD.

No 1. J Graham's shoe shop, A Bradshaw, returning officer.

No 2. Crandell's office, A Cullon, returning officer.

13. The 18th day of February, 1893, at the Town Clerk's office in the Town of Lindsay, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon is hereby fixed as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the various polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk respectively on behalf of persons interested in, and promoting or the opposing this By-Law respectively.

14. The 21st day of February, 1893, at the Town Clerk's office in the Town of Lindsay, at twelve o'clock noon, is hereby fixed as the time and place when the clerk of this Council shall sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-Law respectively.

APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS AND OTHER ROUTINE MATTERS.—THE COUNCIL SETTLES DOWN TO BUSINESS, MAKE A FEW GRANTS AND PASS SOME BY-LAWS.

The statutory meeting of the County Council of the County of Victoria opened, at the Chambers, on Tuesday. All the members answered the roll call and the venerable Clerk Matchett, and his able assistant, Mr. McNeilly were in harness.

The clerk announced that all the members had taken the necessary declarations of office and qualification and were entitled to take their seats.

HOPKINS GETS IT.

Moved by Mr. Lownesbrough, seconded by Mr. Alton, That Mr. Hopkins be Warden for 1893.

Moved by Mr. Kelly, seconded by Mr. Lithgow, That Mr. Bottum be Warden for 1893.

On motion the vote was taken by ballot and the clerk announced the result as being a tie, each of the nominees having received thirteen votes.

The clerk then called on Dr. Vrooman as the representative of the township having the highest assessment to give the casting vote.

The Doctor at first seemed a little diffident and suggested that another ballot be taken, but after one or two members of the council had made a few remarks, he decided to act and plumped for Hopkins.

Messrs. Lownesbrough and Alton as mover and seconder duly installed the new Warden in his comfortable chair.

THE FIRST SHOT.

Warden Hopkins returned thanks for the high honor accorded him by his election to the chair of such an important body, and hoped with the able assistance of the members of the Council and Messrs. Matchett and McNeilly, that he would fill the chair to the satisfaction of all.

THE STRIKERS.

Moved by Mr. Switzer, seconded by Dr. Wood, That Messrs. Samuel Irwin and Dr. Cornwall be the auditors of the Administration of Justice accounts.—Carried.

The Warden nominated Mr. D. McRae and the Council appointed Mr. John Kelly as the auditors for 1893.
