ENGLAND'S NEW WARSHIPS.

AMPLE PROVISION MADE TO MAINTAIN THE NAVAL SUPPLY.

Four First-Class Battleships, Four Gunboats of a New Type and Thirty-Two Torpedo Destroyers Ordered by the Admiralty.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The Daily News says: "The Admiralty have made ample provision to fully maintain the strength of the navy and keep the dockyards employed in building four first-class warships similar to the Majestic and Magnificent, each costing about a million and with 15,000 tons coal capacity."

THE FRENCH AT FAULT.

FRANCE WILL MAKE AMENDS.

FOR THE SHOOTING OF BRITISH TROOPS IN SIERRA LEONE.

It is Admitted by Officers on the Spot That Lieut. Moritz Blundered—Official Despatches Concerning the Shooting—Comments of the Press.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Col. A. B. Ellis of the West Indian regiment has telegraphed to the P. M. H. Campbell-Bannerman, Secretary of State for War, the despatches being dated Warina, Dec. 22 as follows: "Before daybreak this morning our camp was suddenly attacked by a strong force of natives, several of whom were armed with rifles. For 40 minutes there was a hot fire. The enemy used trees for cover. The killed of the West India regiment are: Lieut. Liston, Second Lieut. Wroughton, Sergt. Carraher and four privates. The killed of the constabulary were: Capt. Lendy and two privates. The severely wounded were Sergt. Field and 14 privates of the regiment and three privates of the constabulary."

"The fire slackened, we advanced and found seven magazine rifles and eight Chasse-Pots. Shortly after a wounded prisoner reported that we had been attacked by Lieut. Moritz of the French army, 32 Senegalese sharpshooters at 1200 Kisi. The prisoner stated that Lieut. Moritz had left Warina with this force against the Sofas at the end of September and had arrived Dec. 21 at Tembi-kunda, 50 miles northeast of Warina. Lieut. Moritz, hearing that there was war in the Comoh district, believed it was being carried on by the Sofas under Porerkerri, a Sofa chief, who was trying to escape from the British troops and join the Sultan Samor. Lieut. Moritz left on the morning of Dec. 21 and halted on Dec. 22 fifteen miles northeast of our camp. He left the camp at midnight under a full moon and attacked us, believing us to be Sofas."

"I wrote to Lieut. Moritz explaining the situation. A letter had been previously sent on Dec. 13 to the commanding French officer at Kisi, in Sahurra, giving notice of the approach of the British."

"Another letter has been sent to the French Commander at Kisi, informing him of the occurrence and assuring him that the friendly relations existing will not be disturbed owing to Lieut. Moritz's mistake."

"Warina is within our own sphere, in which is the source of the Babbes River, which flows eastward."

WHISKY AND TOBACCO EXPORTS.

The Inland Revenue Returns Show a Gratifying Increase in Every Section.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 8.—The annual report of the Department of Inland Revenue for the fiscal year ended June 30 last is printed and ready for distribution. From it it appears the total revenue for the year was \$8,520,230, an increase of \$443,704 over last year and of \$1,067,567 over the average of the four previous years.

In excise the increases were: Spirits \$265,330, malt \$72,184, cigars \$58,089, tobacco \$24,137, methylated spirits \$10,264, and other items not showing much change.

The quantity of spirits produced during the year was 3,856,955 proof gallons, an increase of 358,722 over last year. The quantity entered for consumption was 2,731,896 gallons, an increase of 185,961 gallons.

The increase of exports from 8731 gallons in 1888-89 to 51,239 gallons in 1892-93 leads Commissioner Miall to say in his report: "This is believed to be largely due to the fact that the guarantee of age—when bottled abroad—is becoming known and appreciated abroad, and the enforced maturing has necessarily improved the quality. There seems to be good reason to believe that Canadian whiskeys will soon constitute an appreciable proportion of the exports of our manufactured goods."

The transactions in malt show that 53,933,419 pounds were manufactured and 1,765,533 imported, a decrease from last year of 2,745,484 in the quantity manufactured, and of 4,954,033 from the average of the four previous years.

ports show a very marked increase, being 109,431 pounds, or 282,125 pounds above the average. Cigars also show a very marked increase in manufacture, sales and exports. The quantity manufactured was 114,340,490, which is 6,412,677 over last year and 14,112,861 more than the average of the four previous years.

The number of packages of Canadian petroleum inspected during the year is 293,821 and the fees collected thereon \$26,021. The number of imported inspected by officers of the department is 152,122, and the fees collected thereon \$30,322.10.
