> LONDON, Jan. 8. - Particulars concerning the battle between French and British troops near Warina, on the frontier of Sierra Leone, Africa, received Saturday says that the British force, numbering 500 native troops, were sent against the Sofas under Alfmay Samadoo, a rebellious chief. They were encamped near Warins, in Cannoh District, within the sphere of British influence, and just before daylight on December 23 the force was attacked by 30 Senegaleze sharpshooters, supported by 1200 native French auxiliaries, under Lieut. Moritz of the French regular army. The French opened fire upon the British, who replied, and after the fighting had continued some time, the French retired, and Lieut. WHISKY AND TUBACCO EXPORTS.

The Inland Revenue Returns Show Gratifying Increase in Every Section.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan 8.—The annual report of the Department of Iuland Revenue for the fiscal year ended June 30 last is printed and ready for distribution. From it it appears the total revenue for the year was \$8,520,230, an increase of \$443,704 over last year and of \$1,067,567 over the average of the four previous years. Every item shows an increase, excise being \$436,588, public \$2386, weights and measures, etc., \$4119, and other revenue \$558 more than last year. In excise the increases were: Spirits \$265,380, mal: \$72,184, cigars \$58,089, tobacco \$24,137, methylated spirits \$10,364, the other items not showing much change.

The quantity of spirits produced during the year was 3,856,955 proof gallons, an increase of 358,723 over last year. The quantity entered for consumption was 2,731,896 gallons, an increase of 185,961 gallons. The quantity held in stock on July 1 was 13,503,819 proof gallons, which is the largest by nearly half a million gallons ever held by Canadian distillers, and is about the French authorities as to the presence 2,000,000 gallons over the average of the four previous years. The raw material used during the year was over \$4,000,000 younds, of which nearly 50,000,000 were Indian corn, 10,000,000 rye, \$,000,000 malt and the balance wheat, oats and barley.


