**Death of Mr. William Beatty.**

It is with extreme regret that we this week chronicle the death of Mr. Wm. Beatty of Toronto, formerly of Omemece. He was suddenly taken off on Sunday morning while dressing, by a stroke of apoplexy. Up to the instant of his death he appeared in perfect health, and the fearfully sudden shock to his family and friends was terrible. We give the following from the *Empire* of Monday:—

Mr. William Beatty died suddenly on Sunday morning at his residence on Jarvis street. He was one of the most prominent business men, and one of the most widely respected citizens of Toronto. In his 70th year, he was as active and exact in his business habits, perhaps, as many men in the prime of life. He was wonderfully well preserved. On Saturday he was down as usual at his establishment on King street east, attending to the affairs of an unusually busy day. Up to the moment of his sudden attack, in fact, he was in the enjoyment of his customary health. Mr. Beatty was in no way predisposed to apoplexy, and the stroke was all the more shocking to his family on that account. He died at eight o'clock.

Mr. Beatty was born in the county of Donegal, Ireland, in August of 1820. He came to Quebec in 1839, and shortly after removed to Omemece, in the county of Victoria, where he went into the mercantile business. He stood high in the estimation of the people of that district, was in the commission of the peace, and held the rank of captain in the local volunteer corps. In politics he was a conservative and though he was again and again requested to stand for election in the Dominion Parliament, he refused on the score that he did not like the cares of public life. In 1874 Mr. Beatty came to Toronto, and his success in this city is so well known that it does not need to be told here. He leaves three children, one of them a partner in the business which the old gentlemen so successfully built up.

The sympathy which was felt throughout the city by the business portion of the citizens was fully evinced by the large number of prominent merchants and others who attended the funeral obsequies, which took place from his late residence, 186 Jarvis street to the new Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

The religious services were performed by the Rev. Dr. Potts assisted by Rev. Mr. Hooker, of the Methodist, of which church Mr. Beatty was a consistent member, and Rev. Wm. Burns of Millbrook.

The pall-bearers were chosen from among Mr. Beatty's oldest friends, being Hon. S. C. Wood, Warring Kennedy, J. J. Withrow, H. E. Clarke, M. P. P. G. Kerr Jr. Q. C. and Joseph Cooper of Lindsay.

E. Percy Beatty, Fred R. Beatty, M. McLaughlin, son-in-law of the deceased, John Beatty, Joseph Beatty and John Graham were the chief mourners, and among those who followed the cortege to the cemetery were Jas. Beatty, Q. C., Rev. Mr. McAndrew, Dr. Barwick, J. Herbert Mason, J. R. James, E. J. Lennox, Joseph Flavell, W. A. Sherwood and S. C. Wood Jr.

There were many floral offerings, most of them from relatives and friends of the family. One, however, was specially noticeable as showing the esteem in which the deceased was held by those with whom he came in daily contact in the course of business. This was a magnificent pillow bearing the inscription "At Rest," which was presented by the employees of the firm of which Mr. Beatty was so long the principal.
