WINNIPEG'S GREAT BONSPIEL.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 7.—The Empire of Monday says: All preparations have been made for the Winnipeg bonspiel which opens here on Tuesday next, and it promises to be one of the greatest curling events in the history of America. It is expected that about 80 rinks or 320 players, will enter the grand challenge, or opening competition, and to accommodate them 15 sheets of ice will be prepared. There will be representatives from St. Paul, Minneapolis, Ontario, and from all the principal provincial and western towns, including players from Calgary and Prince Albert. Forty curlers from the United States will arrive here tomorrow. Magnificent and costly trophies are offered, valued at \$2,500.

LINDSAY'S CHAMPIONS EN ROUTE.

PORT ARTHUR, Feb. 7.—J. D. Flavelle's Lindsay rink arrived yesterday. They played two matches here in the afternoon against Whalen's rink, beating them by two, and in the evening against Jones' rink, beating them also by two.
