

> The Leaning Tower of Saragoon. A committee appointed to report on the famous Torre Nuova in the Piazza San Filipe, in the capital of Aragon, has issued a pesssimistic account. It is feared that this clock tower—a very fine example of the kind—will have to be pulled down. Excessive rains and floods have caused a subsidence of the soil and the structure is deemed unsafe. The construction of this torre inclinada was begun in the fifteenth century, under the direction of two Spanish, one Jewish and two Moorish architects. It is octagonal in form, 300 feet high, 45 in diameter and leans about 10 feet out of the perpendicular. Stone steps, 260 in number, lead inside to the top gallery, whence a magnificent and beautiful view is obtained over the city itself, the fertile plains of Aragon watered by the rapidflowing Ebro and away to the north where the Pyrenees are seen. The edifice, built of bricks, has at a distance a Moorish aspect, the face of the structure being diapered with brickwork, but the design and execution are much coarser than are generally seen in purely Moorish buildings; the various windows, galleries, battlements and turrets, together with designs partly Byzantine, partly Arabesque, demonstrates its mixed architecture. It has been stated that the leaning of the tower was due to the caprice of the architects, but an old crack in its side and a careful examination of the foundation led to the conclusion that it was want of care on the part of the builders. 




