THE SPEECH FROM THE THRONE. Full text of His Excellency's Adaress at The Opening of the House.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26. - The following is the full text of the address of His Excellency, Lord Stanley, at the opening of the House to-day. Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentle-

men of the House of Commons. In meeting you at the commencement of another session of Parliament, it affords me pleasure to congratulate you on the continued progress which the history of the past year unfolds with regard to Canada. 6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice at the end of their time if they do not wish to continue taking the paper, otherwise the publisher may send until such time as a definite order to discontinue, accompanied

7. The man who allows his subscription to run for some time unpaid and then orders the paper discontinued or asks the post-master to mark it "Refused" leaves himself liable to punishment.


