The young men's meeting last Sunday was full of interest, and was largely attended. Mr. Geo. Wilder gave a Bible Reading on "What a Christian should be." The meeting next Sunday will be addressed by Mr. J. C. Harstone on the subject "How shall a young man cleanse his way." All young men are cordially invited. The Orchestra will lead the singing.

Board of Education.  
The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education was held on Tuesday evening. Present Chairman McNeillie; Messrs. R. Kennedy, Pilkie, Deacon, O'Leary, Macmurchy, Matthews, Stewart, Anderson and Flavelle.  
The minutes of the former meeting were read and approved.  
Principal Harstone's report showed an attendance at the Collegiate Institute of 285 for February, with an average of 253; and Principal Broderick's report \$26 in the Public Schools, an average for the month 710.—Reports received and filed.  
The use of a room in the Collegiate Institute was granted the class in French between the hours of 4 and 5 o'clock p.m. in certain evenings of the week.  
Mr. Stewart presented the report of the finance committee re-recommending the payment of several accounts.—Report adopted.  
Mr. Macmurchy presented the report of the management committee. The report stated that certain supplies had been given the Public Schools and Collegiate Institute and that Mr. Geo. Blackwell had been engaged as instructor in drill and as caretaker of the Institute at a salary of \$100 for the remainder of the term; also recommended that Mr. Richardson be re-engaged as caretaker of the Francis-st., and North Ward schools at a salary of \$150 per annum, also Mr. John Mosgrove as caretaker of the Union school at a salary of \$300 per annum, and the remaining caretakers at their former salaries.—Report adopted.  
On motion the board decided to purchase the lot of one acre on the East side of the East Ward school for \$400.  
The petition of the Guelph board of Education to the Local Assembly asking that the minimum age for admission to the public schools for Ontario be raised to at least six years, was endorsed, and the clause added that every encouragement be given to the establishment of kindergarten classes for the earlier ages.  
Mr. Pilkie gave notice of motion that he would move at the next meeting that the town council be petitioned to pass a by-law that all children under 16 years of age found running at large upon our streets after 9 p.m. be taken in charge by the authorities.  
On motion the name of Mr. D. R. Anderson was added to the management committee.  
The report of Mr. Head, collector of fees for the Collegiate Institute gave the amount of fees for February as \$280.25 no arrears.—The board adjourned.

**NEWS ITEMS.**  
Mr. John D. Rockefeller has presented the University of Chicago with a gift of \$1,000,000 as a thank offering for returning health.  
The Quebec Royal Commission will resume its investigation in Montreal to-day, when the Whelan matter, the Montreal Court-house job, and the transactions with the Montreal banks will be sifted.  
Mr. James B. Morrison, accountant, Toronto, in an affidavit in an action now in the High Court of Justice, charges that Mr. David G. Ross, accountant in the Crown Lands Department of Ontario, was given \$750 in cash and a promissory note for \$750 for the assistance Mr. Ross and others gave in obtaining a patent on a lot in the District of Algoma for Mr. Morrison. Mr. Ross in an affidavit denies the charge.  
The London shipowners and emigration agents are dismayed at the prospect of legislation being enacted in the United States on the lines recommended by the Immigration Commissioners, tending to the restriction of emigration. A special cable says the feeling is growing in England that the Government will aim to take some steps to check the inflowing stream of undesirable immigration.  
Matthew Lawrence, son of a farmer in Magherafelt, county Londonderry, recently committed suicide in a most determined manner. He cut an artery in his arm, but death not being quick enough he procured a gun and shot himself in the abdomen. He lingered for some time, told the doctors he wanted to die, and afterwards expired. He had recently returned from South Africa, where he amassed a considerable fortune.

In the absence of the President, Mrs. Hanna of Uxbridge presided. The officers for the ensuing year are:—President, Mrs. D. J. McIntyre, Lindsay; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Hanna, Uxbridge, Mrs. Ross, Lindsay, Mrs. Galloway, Kirkfield, Mrs. McAulay, Woodville; Treasurer, Mrs. C. C. McPhader, Cannington; Secretary, Lillie H. McLennan, Lindsay. There are now twenty-one auxiliaries and four Mission Bands in the Lindsay Presbyterian Society, with a total membership of 487. Contributions were sent to the General Treasurer amounting to \$1000, and besides this \$246.00 worth of clothing was sent to the North-West in October last. The evening meeting was addressed by Rev. J. McCarthy, a returned missionary from China. The next meeting is to be held in Lindsay and is to last for two days.  
The Detroit Free Press of Thursday last says: "Dr. C. L. Coulter, a prominent medical man of Toronto, Ont., for several years health officer at Lindsay, Ont., and division surgeon of the Grand Trunk Railway, arrived at the Hotel Cadillac yesterday. Dr. Coulter has of late become widely known in medical circles as the inventor of a combined vaporizer and inhaler and as the head of the Coulter Vaporizer Manufacturing Company of Toronto. The doctor is now on his way to Washington for the purpose of consulting with the Surgeon General of the United States who is desirous of introducing the Coulter vaporizer and inhaler into the various army posts in this country. A large number of Detroit physicians called on Dr. Coulter at his hotel yesterday to see the practical workings of his invention, and all expressed themselves as delighted with it. It is especially valuable, medical authority concedes, in the treatment of diseases of the throat, lungs and nose by inhalation, and is also a perfect instrument for deodorizing and disinfecting sick rooms, hospitals, railway cars and public buildings. It is very simple in its construction, and is so arranged that by saturating a small piece of sponge with essential oil of any kind the passage of a current of steam through the sponge generates a powerful vapor. Yesterday afternoon Dr. Coulter gave a practical demonstration of what his vaporizer will do, by filling one of the upper hallways of the Cadillac with a delicious odor of jessamine which suggested the close proximity of a conservatory of sweet smelling flowers."
