### IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

GLADSTONE HAS NO LIKING FOR BI-METALLISM.

He Says the United States Took the Initlative and Must Offer a Tangible Scheme Before He Would Adopt a Double Standard of Currency.

LONDON, March 1 .- Sir Henry Meysey-Thompson, Liberal-Unionist member for North Handswo th, Staffordshire, moved in the House of Commons yesterday that the British Government should use its influence to bring about a reassembling of the International Monetary Conference with the object of finding a remedy for evils attendant upon the divergence of values between gold and silver.

Sir Henry argued that mono-metallism was a national misfortune and that a fixed bi-metallic ratio was the sole remedy for existing difficulties growing out of the cur-

rency question. Mr. Samuel Montague, Liberal member for Whitechapel and well-known as a member of the banking house of Samuel Montague & Company, earnestly supported Sir Henry's motion and argued in favor of bi-metallism.

Other bi metallists also addressed the House in behalf of the proposition. Mr. Giadstone, in reply, reminded the House that the International Monetary Conference met at the initiative of the United States, and it would be an unprecedented proceeding now to deprive America of the initiative. England had followed the Brussels discussion with more or less sympathy, and had a right to expect from the United States a declaration as to what step that country proposed to take next. In the opinion of the Government no plan yet proposed showed how it was possible to change the standard of value of Great Britain. [Hear, hear.] It would place the Government in a ridiculous position if it should assume the initiative in reopening -Out at "Cross Creeks Farm" the the conference, having nothing to recommend for discussion.

Continuing, Mr. Gladstone said that England was not alone among civilized nations in her determination to adhere to her present monetary system. Seven other powers, without the slightest reference to England, had signified their intention not to change their currency. Half of the powers represented at the conference had shown that they leaned towards bi-metallism, but as yet they had not given the most shadowy indication of what change they were prepared to

In conclusion, Mr. Gladstone made an elaborate exposition of the benefits of monometallism and the dangers of bi-metallism. Mr. Chaplin, President of the Board of Agriculture under the last Salisbury administ ation, supported the motion of Sir Heary Meysey-Thompson. At Brussels conference he Bertram Currie (British delegate) persistently and deliberately did everything in

Sir William Vernon-Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, repudiated Mr. Chaplin's charge against Mr. Currie. The British delegates, he said, had been almost the only ones to support the American resolution in favor of extending the use of silver. From first to last bi-metallism had been at the bottom of the conference, as it was at the bottom of present debate. The failure of the conference had been due to the absence of all definite proposals. If the United States should reconvene the conference and submit definite proposals, the British Government would be happy to send back their delegates, but could not be expected to provide a scheme for the more extensive use of silver.

Sir Henry Meysey-Thompson's motion eventually was rejected by a vote of 229 to 148. The announcement of the vote was received with loud Liberal cheers.
