A meeting of the council of the Board of Trade was held on Wednesday night. Two matters of great importance to this town were under consideration.

In 1897 our output was 13,000 pounds. In 1898 it was 15,000 " 1899 " 17,000 " 1900 " 20,000 " 1901 " 21,000 " 1902 " 23,000 " 1903 " 25,000 "

Last year and in '07 our machinery ran overtime. Now we must advance or go back. There are two courses possible to increase our present capacity.

Mr. Graham-I am glad to see our own citizens showing enterprise and also independence of bonuses or material aid. I certainly think we should recommend Mr. Horn's request to the favor of the town council.

THE MEMBER FOR NORTH VICTORIA SPEAKS.

COL. HUGHES TALKS IN THE COMMONS ON THE GOVERNMENT'S SCHEMING.

In the course of a speech in the House on Wednesday the member for North Victoria made a stirring attack on the government along the following lines:

Last year the government introduced a Yukon railway bill, to which he gave his support, although disagreeing with some of its details. The senate had thrown out the bill, but it was the duty of the government to have brought in this year an amended bill, and then, if the senate rejected it, to appeal to the country.

The Liberals could not take credit to themselves or their policy for their accession to power, for it was brought about by dissensions in the Conservative ranks.

On the Manitoba school question the government had again played a double game. The so-called settlement was satisfactory to neither party inasmuch as it retained the most questionable features of the Separate school question, while not giving the Catholic minority what they

ANOTHER STEAMSHIP HORROR

SEVENTY LIVES LOST BY THE WRECK OF THE STELLA-A HOLIDAY CATASTROPHE.

The passenger steamer Stella, plying between the Channel Islands and Southampton, crashed upon the dreaded Casquet rocks, near the island of Alderney, Thursday afternoon, in a dense fog, and foundered in ten minutes.

The Stella, which belongs to the London and Southwestern Railway Company, left Southampton at noon Thursday, conveying the first daylight excursion of the season to the Channel Islands. There were about 185 passengers on board and the crew numbered about 35 men.

SUCCESS WITH A SMALL SILO.

Mr. J. W. Cliphamp of Sparrow Lake, Ont., writes the Orillia Packet as follows:

"For several years I had been growing an acre or more of fodder corn for winter corn feed, attempting to preserve it by out-door shocking in the old way of curing corn fodder, but always with rather poor results. In a wet season the corn butts would become imbedded in the soft soil and freeze fast, capillary attraction would carry moisture up the stalk so that the lower part would be worthless for food.

I wished for a silo, but feared that with only two or three animals I should not be able to feed the stuff fast enough to prevent wasting on the surface through too long an exposure to the air before being fed off. I was told that it was not advisable to build a silo of less than ten feet diameter, that the silage would not settle well in a smaller size.
